Mr. Tuttle retires beause of ill-health, and also because believes that the New Haven Compeny should assume the direct respon-sibility of the administration of the Boston and Maine. He was granted eave of absence for the remainder of the term. Ever since the New Haven. Company obtained control of the Boston and Maine system there has been general expectation that President Tuttle would retire at an early date. At the last annual meeting of the Co. Mr. Tuttle announced that he believed that the time had arrived for the New Haven Company to take the active direction of the Boston and Maine, but in compliance with request of the New Haven Board of Directors he consented to remain President for another year. Frequent reports of his resignation since that time have been emphatically denied, and his retirement to-day came as a surprise to the community.
