

Heart Stimulant.

Professor's Invention For Last A Treatment.

A small metal box containing an lectric light globe and a cup for nolding alcohol is the basis of an intention which, it is expected, will prove of great service in the treatnent of pneumonia. The apparaiu is the invention of Professor Leonard Hill, of the London Hospital.

"For some time," said Professo stimulant to the labouring heart neumonia is via the lungs in th orm of vapor. My apparatus ar ranges for a mixed vapour of oxyger water and alcohol to be carried lirectly to the lungs, whence is reaches the heart from the pulmonary eins. Thence the stimulant is carried directly to the heart muscle i self by the coronary arteries."

Describing the need for such an apparatus a physician stated recently Death in pneumonia comes not be ause there is not sufficient undiscased lung tissue left to breathe with but because the heart fails. Hence the judicious administration of hear gan over until the lung symptoms subside is the chief point in treat ment. By using Professor Hill's apparatus the heart can be reached by the stimulant much more accurately and quickly than if the alcohol was White felt hats can be successfully given in the ordinary way by drink-


