Financially the Board has not been fortunate. The income from Caribou Licenses fell short of the estimate by \$2000 and the Rod Tax fell short of what was expected by \$1.190. The expenditure of the Board for the year was \$10.545, 41. To meet this expenditure, there was available \$5,910.00 from the Caribou License and Rod Tax, and a nest egg to the extent of \$1,801.86, the balance of a fund known as "The Game License Fund," which will not be available again. The expenditure of this sum left a deficit of \$2,833.55. The reports set forth that This deficit has been met by a special appropriation of \$3,000 to the credit of the Board, made by Executive authority."


