London, June 7.-More sensational evidence was given at the Titanic inquiry to-day, to explain why the restaurant staff were drowned. A restaurant clerk, named Paul Mouge, alleged the staff were prevented from reaching the second-class deck by some stewards, and thus lost their

Witness, who spoke broken English. said he was aroused after the collision by the ringing of an alarm bell. He asked what was the matter. Somebody said: "There is no danger. It is better for you to go to sleep."

Witness went on the boat deck, where he saw Captain Smith encouraging women to enter the boats. They seemed disinclined to go, saying they were safer on board.

A large number of third-class passengers went on deck at the same time. After going on the boat deck, ne went below again to awake the chef. The chef lost his temper, that s, he was agitated, and lost his presence of mind. Other members of the restaurant staff assembled on the third-class passengers deck at the af-
