Girl Falls Over Monroe's Wharf.

While attempting to get on board a small schooner at Monroe's wharf last night Miss Ellen Jane Writers, of Bonavista, fell overboard, and had it not been for the prompt action of Mr. Absalom Martin, of Harbor Grace, steward of the schooner Mildred, she undoubtedly would have met an untimely death.

It happened that the unfortunate girl had just stepped on to a ladder leading to the schooner when it skidded and losing her balance she fell between the wharf and the schooner. The steward of the Mildred, who happened to be on deck at the time, saw the woman fall and rushing to her assistance kept her head above water. In the meantime he shouted to Bosun Thomas Whittle and Seaman Reuben Martin, also of the Mildred, to lend a hand, which they did, and together they lifted her on to the deck of the schooner.

Seaman Caught.

A seaman who had only struck town the night before, was arrested yesterday under warrant for desertion. He signed on a fish carrier at the rate of \$75 a month and went to a northern outpost to load. Suddenly he contracted the "sooners" and took passage back to St. John's by the Fogota. His inconspicuous surroundings at the police station have made him reconsider his decision as to whether he will go to sea or not. In all probability he will return to the northward by the Fogota to-morrow and rejoin his vessel.

Laid to Rest.

The funeral of the late John Bryne took place yesterday afternoon from his residence in Wood Street and was attended by a large concourse of citizens. The remains, which were enclosed in a handsome casket, were accompanied by a guard of honour from the Star of the Sea Association of which deceased was a life long member. Rev. Newfoundland Scotch Cured Herring.

Because of a slackening in the demand for Newfoundland Scotch cured herring in New York many operators here have made concessions in their prices during the past week and while the range of quotations remains unchanged, most factors have been selling at the inside rather than the outside figures. In other words the prevailing price for Newfoundland Scotch cured herring of good quality is \$22 per barrel, as against a price of \$24 and \$25 which prevailed a fortnight ago. At the same time holders of fancy goods have been able to get the high prices and many of them still hold out for them. The fact that Newfoundland packers have made contracts with New York merchants for fall pack herring as low as \$10 has naturally had its influence on the market here where the greatest quantity of Newfoundland herring is sold. This low figure is quoted by one of the oldest salt fish houses here which has been in the herring business for more than 20 years. Others have paid as high as \$15 f.o.b. St. John's it is reported, and the general market will probably be at about this figure. There is a limited quantity of Newfoundland herring in first hands here at present, but the market appears to be well supplied, especially the jobbing trade. The present dullness is due to the lack of consuming demand in many quarters of the city, and this is believed by many to have resulted from the high prices at which the herring must be sold in the retail trade.

Reports from Newfoundland this week convey the intelligence that in some parts of the island and that some pickled herring has been packed. This goods will probably be shipped to New York about the middle of November, but it is doubtful if it will compare with the Crown branded goods which comes later. As the New York market will be practically cleared of herring next month, it is probable that a good demand will be in evidence by that time. Predictions are that the market for fall herring will open at about \$20 per barrel here, but it is possible that the price will be higher if lots for which \$15 per barrel was paid ex-St. John's arrive before the close of the month. The early pack of pickled herring will hardly make the market for the other and perhaps better grades.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette, Oct. 27th.

Your Boys and Girls.

Articles are poor and who do not do justice to their regular meals, should be given an extra allowance of hot broth or milk or an occasional cup of chocolate, between meals with bread or a rusk. Children should never be hurried off to school in the morning with an insufficient and rapidly eaten breakfast.

During school days the meals must be abundant and must contain sufficient proteids, starches, sugars and inorganic salts to meet the constant demands for these constituents of perfect food. Suppers should be light, not stimulating and the food should be made savory and appetizing.
