#### CONGRESS.

Congress is a large and nimble debating society which is supposed to act as a megaphone for the common people. It meets once a year in Washington, D.C., and remains in session until all the money in sight has been appropriated for worthy and beneficial purposes.

There are two branches of Congress—the Senate and the House of Representatives. Owing to that pernicious infringement upon vested rights known as the primary election law, it is harder to get into the Senate to-day than it was ten years ago, when a man could be elected by long distance telephone without having to promise anything but a few post-office buildings. Under this law, however, a candidate for the Senate has to hang his silt-lined frock coat in the closet, don the short and glistening alpaca and attack the administration six times a day from the tail end of an observation car. He is also obliged to spend his entire salary for the first four terms before reaching the point where he can take full and uninterrupted advantage of the franking privilege. On this account thousands of bright, brainy men who would make splendid senators refuse to go into training for fear of burdening their heirs and assigning with chattel mortgages.

The House of Representatives is a ponderous body whose mission in life is to enact bills and then pass them on to the Senate for interment. This is a very satisfactory arrangement, as it not only mollifies an angry constituency but gives the Senate a reputation for patriotic defense of the public treasury. The chief duties of a representative are landing post-office appointments, securing special pensions and placating inflamed rural route patrons who cannot reach the Post-master-General with a club. There is a popular impression abroad that a senator or representative has nothing to do except answer roll call and draw long, green pay checks, but

this is a mistake. If the average business man had to put in as long hours as many members of Congress do, he would take a job in a sweat-shop and call it a sinecure. There is considerable pure ivory in the American Congress, but mighty little graft, and many a foreign or domestic intriguer has found that it is harder to buy an American representative than it is to find a soft shirt that will fit around the neck.

### Salt and Bulk Herring.

Split herring of good quality is growing scarce in New York as a result of the steady demand of the past few weeks, and while there are fairly liberal quantities expected to arrive from Newfoundland and other points along the coast and in the Maritime Provinces it is probable that there will be a distinct shortage before the new fall caught goods have been received in this market. Operators in this city are holding their stocks on the basis of \$11 and \$13 for medium and large, respectively, but it is possible to purchase at slightly lower prices in some quarters. The fact that few dealers are able to supply split herring places this grade on the premium list for the present. Round herring is generally held at \$12 and \$13, according to size, and there is a fair supply in local hands. As there is only a trifling demand in evidence for this grade at present prices are quoted on a nominal basis by some.

There is a good demand for all grades of Scotch-cured herring in New York at present and comparatively small stocks to draw from. Alaska Scotch-cured herring is held firmly at the quoted levels and there is little to be had here. British Columbia Scotch-cured and Norwegian-cured herring has been selling in a small way, but stocks are now practically cleaned up in New York. American pack Scotch-cured herring of the summer and fall catch is coming into the market at prices ranging from \$18 to \$23 per barrel, according to size and quality, and it is reported that there are fairly large quantities yet to come. Belly cuts are not in active demand at present and the market continues on a nominal basis at \$12.50 and \$14 per barrel.—N.Y. Fishing Gazette, Nov. 17.

### The Stranded Beverley

The latest news received up to last night from the stranded steamer Beverley was that she was still resting on a mud bank in St. Mary's harbour, but circumstances regarding her were favourable, as Captain Turner, who, with his crew, is standing by, has wired the owners that the ship was leaking only slightly. All yesterday and again to-day the work of taking the four cargo out of her was carried on to lighten her so that she could be easily refloated when a high tide prevailed. The S. S. Erik, which left here yesterday afternoon, is now at the scene of the wreck taking a load of the salvaged flour to bring to St. John's. If conditions continue favorable it is hoped to get the ship off in deep water either to-night or to-morrow morning.

### Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer.

No. 1584.  
Telegram from the Secretary of State to Administrator, St. John's.  
The following announcement was published in the Press on November 26th:

To My People.  
The world-wide struggle for the triumph of Right and Liberty is entering upon its last and most difficult phase. The enemy is striving by desperate assault and subtle intrigue to perpetuate the wrongs already committed and stem the tide of a Free Civilization. We have yet to combat the great task to which more than three years ago we dedicated ourselves. At such a time I would call upon you to devote a special day to Prayer, that we may have the clear-sightedness and strength necessary to the Victory of our Cause. This Victory will be gained only if we steadfastly remember the responsibility which rests upon us and in a spirit of reverent obedience ask the blessing of Almighty God upon our endeavours. With hearts grateful for the Divine Guidance which has led us so far towards our goal, let us seek to be enlightened in our understanding and fortified in our courage in facing the sacrifices we yet may have to make before our work is done.

I therefore hereby appoint January 31st, the first Sunday of the Year, to be set aside as Special Day of Prayer and Thanksgiving in all Churches throughout my Dominions, and require that this Proclamation be read at the services held on that day.
