

Band rendered the Hallelujah Chorus. The parade headed by the ex-Members, known as "Old Comrades" under the command of Sergt. Chafe, then marched back to the Armoury, via Gower, Cochrane and Military Road, when the Colonel Commanding addressed the Battalion and extended his congratulations to the Old Comrades on their fine appearance.

### St. Dunstan's, Stepney, Burned Down.

The most serious fire in a London place of worship since Mr. Spurgeon's Tabernacle was destroyed in 1899, occurred on the morning of Saturday, Oct. 12, 1901, at St. Dunstan's Church, High Street, Stepney. At six o'clock some passers-by noticed dense volumes of smoke issuing from the building. A great burst of flame from the vestry windows, and through the roof directly afterwards, proved that a fierce fire was in progress within. When the firemen arrived they found the vestry and organ loft on fire, and the flames were crackling fiercely among the timbers of the fine roof. Commander Wells, of the Southwark headquarters, directed a "brigade call" to be signalled, and twenty-two steamers and over a hundred firemen were dispatched from all parts of London to the fire, which was at its height at seven o'clock. The roof was on fire from end to end, the organ—recently thoroughly repaired and re-decorated at great cost—was practically reduced to ashes, and the remnants of the fire were flickering in the altar and
