St. Dunstan's, Stepney, Burned Down.

The most serious fire in London since the burning of the Palace of Westminster was destroyed in 1393, occurred on the morning of Saturday, Oct. 12, 1901, at St. Dunstan's Church, High Street, Stepney. At six o'clock some passers-by noticed dense volumes of smoke issuing from the building. A great burst of flame from the vestry windows, and through the roof shortly afterwards, proved that a serious fire was in progress. Within ten minutes the firemen arrived. They found the vestry and organ loft on fire, and the flames were crackling fiercely among the timbers of the fine roof. Commander Wells, of the Southwark headquarters, directed a "brigade No. 1" to be signalled, and twenty-two ladders and over a hundred firemen were dispatched from all parts of London to the fire, which was at its height at seven o'clock. The roof was on fire from end to end, the organ recently thoroughly repaired and re-decorated, a great cost—was practically reduced to ashes, and the remnants of the organ were flickering in the altar and

choir stalls. Some of the beautiful stained glass windows were shattered, the vestry was absolutely gutted, and there were constant cracks into the interior of the building as the half-consumed beams supporting the roof collapsed and fell. The rector, the Rev. A. E. Dalton—with many willing workers, saved what valuables they could, and were greatly relieved to find, when the fire had somewhat abated, that the church plate and registers (which were kept in an iron cupboard in the vestry) were safe, but everything else in the vestry was destroyed, as was also the brass lectern, together with the large Bible upon it, but the pulpit escaped, and the nave, with the exception of the centre roof, was untouched. The fire was got under control by a quarter to eight o'clock.

Steamer for Labrador.

In response to representations made by planters and others in Northern Districts—that a number of sailormen are still on Labrador with their catches unsecured, the Government has decided to send the S. S. Diana there to bring them home.
