

To Canada in Four Days

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London states that a scheme for a fast service of steamers, which will bring Canada within four days of the United Kingdom, is now on the way to become an accomplished fact. It will be maintained by a fleet of eight fast vessels of 50,000 tons, each with high power turbine engines burning oil fuel, which, it is anticipated, will develop a speed of 26 knots across the Atlantic. The vessels will accommodate 600 first class and 3,000 second class passengers and will bring Halifax, Nova Scotia, within four days of Liverpool, and Vancouver within 81/2 days. The service is not to be confined to the Anglo-Canadian routes, but will be extended to all parts of the Empire. For instance, it is intended that the journey from Liverpool to Sydney, via Vancouver and across Canada by rail, will be accomplished in 201/2 days, or two-thirds of the time that it takes

Coal King on Trial. Accused of cheating the German

War Department of millions of marks by not paying war prisoners their full wages, Hugo Stinnes & Co. faced a criminal trial at Essen. The case is bringing official attention to numerous charges many of them being made by Socialists in the Reichstag, that Hugo Stinnes was Germany's greatest war profiteer, in that he sold war materials to both sides during the war, and that in his official capacity he systematically ordered the destruction of certain Belgian and French industries for no other reason but to prevent the reconstruction of these rival industries after the war. It is believed that enormous legal consequences will result from the Essen trial. Stinnes, who is Europe's coal king, has had numerous complaints filed against him for failure to receive and pay for goods. If the present test case is successful, the German War Department hopes to recover many millions of marks from Huge Stinnes.

What Should be Planted in the Fall.

At the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, it has not been found satisfactory, taking one year with another, to gant trees of any kind in the fall. Exposure to the long, cold winter beginning shortly after transplanting is not favorable to the trees. Any which will be below the snowline, however, have a much better chance, although in soils where there is danger of heaving, late fall planting is unsafe.

When low-growing shrubs and herbaceous plants are planted in the fall, which is a good time, the sooner it is done the better after the soil becomes moist enough to ensure their not dying from lack of moisture as, when set out early, the plants have a chance to take root again before winter and in the case of herbaceous perennials to make some growth. Raspberries, gooseberries and cur-

rants may be planted successfully in September, and the advantage over spring planting is that if any die they may be replaced in the spring, whereas if planted in the spring it is too late to replace them if they die and a season's growth is lost. If strawberries are planted in the fall they should be planted in September or before to ensure their rooting well and lessening danger from heaving.

New Altitude Record.

Lieut. John A. Macready, test pilot at McCook Field, Dayton, Ohio, shattered the world's altitude record when he attained a height of 40,800 feet in the same Le Pere biplane used by Rodolph C. Schroeder, who set a record of 38,-180 feet on February 28, 1920. Lieutenant Macroady was in the air

one hour and 47 minutes, requiring all but a few minutes of the total flying time to reach his mark. At 39,000 feet ice formed in his oxygen tank but he pressed on until the altimeter registered nearly 41,000 feet. At this point his engine coughed and died. He descended to the ground. Macready's new record is 2,620 feet higher than that of Schroeder, and in this flight the pilot suffered none of the hardship met by the former chief test pilot. Schroeder's eyeballs froze and excessive dilation of the heart kept him in the hospital nearly two weeks after the flight. The flight primarily was for the purpose of testing improvemnets made on the super-charger invented by S. A. Moss, who witnessed the flight, and also a new propellor of very high pitch, perfected by engineers at the McCook field. Captain G. S. E. Hallett, chief of

mechanical designing, and Moss personally prepared the plane for flight, and every precaution was taken to provide auxiliary oxygen tanks for safety of the pilot. The biplane was designed in Jar
