The Unemployment Situation.

DISSATISFACTION OVER RELIEF WORK.

Yesterday afternoon the Committee of the Unemployed began the selection of 50 men to work on the Sanitarium pipe line, but they had scarcely commenced when a large number of men, who had assembled in front of the Employment Bureau began to express their dissatisfaction over the arrangements. Apparently the men wanted employment for 500, and they would not consent to work on a contract job. When the first few names were called out a rush was made to get into the Millit Building, and the police had a trying time to prevent the crowd from getting through. Mr. Bennett, one of the Committee men, coming out of the building urged the men to be orderly and satisfactory arrangements would be made. The men, however, were not assured and doubting the intentions of their representatives they called a new committee. With this end in view a large number left the scene and assembled in Bannerman Park, where they were addressed from the Band Stand by Mr. Caleb Robins. He urged the men to restrain themselves and allow the 250 men to go to work. In the meantime he promised to investigate the conditions of the contracts and see that the Committee did not show favour. He said it was not fair to expect men from the East End to be compelled to go as far as the Water Works or Waterford Bridge for employment, and they should see that work was given them in their own end of the district. Efforts to form another committee, however, failed and the men returned to the Millit Building. The work on the pipe line starts today and Mr. John Davey has been given the contract. As soon as tenders have been accepted another 150 men will be given work on the Asylum Road, and an additional fifty will be engaged making preparations for the new cab stands.

Copper Eskimos.

The least known and most primitive denizens of the far north are the Copper Eskimos, who make their home at Coronation Gulf. The strange lives and beliefs of these people are made known in the report of Dr. Jenness, ethnologist with the southern party of the Canadian Arctic expedition of 1913-15. According to Mr. Jenness, who spent a year with the Copper Eskimos, they believe the earth to be a great expanse of land and water at whose four corners stand wooden columns supporting the heavens. On the surface of the sky is another world like our own, across which wander the semi-spiritual beings—the sun, moon and stars. The sun is believed to be a woman, and the moon a man, and the mountains on the moon are the man's dogs. The stars were once human beings, and animals and the constellation which we know as the "belt of Orion" they believe to have been a party of sealers who never returned to camp. They think that their land is surrounded by races of men who are only semi-human. Their main recreations are singing and dancing.

Companies over Newfoundland will have the benefit of securing an education in wireless telegraphy and by this means be able to secure good positions as wireless operators—as the lads could practice by signalling between stations besides learning the news of the day.
