A Worthy Benevolent Association Resuscitated.

Arrangements for Celebrating the Day of the Patron Saint.

Native Scotchmen and sons of Scotchmen resident in London assembled in large numbers in a temporary apartment in J. W. Jones' auction rooms Thursday evening. Their object was to reorganize the St. Andrew's Society. Robert Reid was in the chair and J. G. Jones acted as secretary.

The constitution of the old society will remain in force. The name was changed from the St. Andrew's and Caledonian to the St. Andrew's Society. The following officers were then elected:

President—Robert Reid.

First Vice-President—J. D. Clarke.

Second Vice-President—A. R. Cooper.

Secretary—James McEwen.

Treasurer—J. W. Jones.

A relief committee was next chosen.

James Shannon, Wm. Howie, Arch. McPherson, Alex. Tytler and J. L. Anderson are the members.

Rev. J. A. Murray, Rev. W. J. Clark, Rev. Geo. Boyd, Rev. James Balmaitre, Rev. W. M. Roger, Rev. M. P. Talling and Rev. Chas. E. McIntyre were appointed as chaplains.

Doctors Waugh, Wishart and Logie will be the society's physicians.

The president stated that he would like a permanent entertainment committee to be appointed. This would also help towards holding musical and literary meetings.

Dr. Gardner, John Fairgrieve, T. H. Pardon, Walter Fairbairn, Walter Simpson and Mary Sheriff will look after the interests of this committee. Others named were J. L. Anderson, Tom Brown and Frank Love.

George Angus and Alex. Milne were chosen as pipers. Mr. Pardon says they must play nothing but classical music.

T. Pardon and J. L. Anderson were then appointed auditors and Donald McDonald collector. Over 30 of those present became members last evening.

It was moved by John W. Jones, seconded by A. FRATERNAL ASSOCIATION.

Organization of a New Society—The Constitution and Officers.

Representatives of the various fraternal benefit societies met Thursday afternoon at Toronto for the purpose of receiving the report of the Committee on Permanent Constitution, election of officers, etc., of the Fraternal Association.

Among the societies represented were the A. O. U. W., John Milne, Col. M. D. Dawson, London, H. B. Ferguson, J. G. Totten and M. D. Carver; Independent Foresters, Dr. Oronhyatekha, J. A. MacGillivray, Dr. Thos. Millman, Rev. A. MacGillivray and David Miller-Oddfellows, J. R. King, A. O. U. W. Relief, J. R. Miller and H. M. Wilkinson; Canadian Home Circle, Rev. John Kay and A. J. Pattison; Select Knights, J. B. Leubsdorf and James Watt; Oddfellows' Relief, Capt. Thos. Donnelly; Royal Templars, Rev. A. M. Phillips, Dr. B. E. McKenzie; Fraternal Mystical Circle, J. A. McMurtry; Chosen Friends, W. F. Montague, W. F. Campbell, jun.; Macacubes, Henry E. Trent; Ancient Foresters, Wm. Williams and D. F. McWatt; Royal Arcanum, Jas. Brande; and others.

The proposed constitution was adopted. The features of the fraternal society are declared to be: "1. The lodge system. 2. Representative government. 3. Ritualistic work. 4. Fraternal assistance to living members in sickness, disfigurement or old age. 5. The payment of benefits to living members for total and physical disability or old age. 6. The payments of benefits to members, and at the death of the members to the families, blood relatives, or dependent orphans of such deceased members. 7. That such fraternal beneficiary societies shall, where practicable, be duly incorporated under Provincial or Dominion laws. No society whose distinctive features do not conform hereto, is eligible to membership in the association, or entitled to be classified a fraternal benefit society."

The first regular annual meeting of the Fraternal Association will be held in Toronto on the second Thursday in January, 1892. Dr. Oronhyatekha was unanimously elected president; John Milne, of Essex Center, was unanimously elected vice-president; J. B. King secretary-treasurer; J. R. Miller counselor, and Dr. B. E. McKenzie medical adviser. The association, it is said, will act as advisory to not less than 150,000 members in Canada.

The News of the Day, Culled and Condensed.

The Canoe mackerel fleet have secured a great catch.

Two Chinamen were smuggled from Windsor into Detroit on Wednesday evening dressed in military uniforms.

The Car, it is said, is only waiting for a chance to choose a successor to M. Vishnegradski as Minister of Finance.

The steamer Charente has arrived at Buenos Ayres with three cases of yellow fever aboard. The news has caused great alarm.

A stockholder of the Chicago Cold Storage Exchange declares that the concern is insolvent, and owes \$250,000 now overdue.

Five cents for wheat and 25 cents for corn was asked yesterday in Chicago for lake cargoes to Buffalo, but as far as a breeze was taken at these figures.

Mr. Mercier has sworn out criminal information for libel in the Police Court against Mr. J. P. Whelan, and the news paper men who published his charges.

An Ottawa telegram says: It is now maintained that Joseph Lyne, who was named guardian of the Connollys' books, and who disappeared with them, is in Pittsburgh.

Mr. Nixon, of the Western University, lately, responded to the toast of "Western at Trinity Medical College annual dinner at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, last night.

J. A. Oblinger, owner of the Bank of Arlington, Arlington, Minn., and postmaster of the village, declared in the amount of \$15,000 to \$20,000. The depositors will lose everything, as the bank was a private one.

A dispatch from Shanghai says the Government has greatly increased the severity of its measures against rioters, and at present seems determined to exert all its power to protect the foreign residents of the empire.

The owners of the British yacht Beagle, Messrs. Bloom and Douglas, and a young man named Joseph Lyne, were recently arrested at Honolulu on the charge of smuggling. It was supposed that they had 50,000 sovereigns on board that had been stolen from a Sydney bank. They spent money lavishly, but had to be released for lack of evidence.

R. S. Bingham, a Methodist minister, who lives near Emory and Henry College, surrendered himself at Abingdon, W. Va., yesterday saying he had shot Frank Queenberry, who had threatened to assassinate him, and who shot him in self-defense. Another report is that the minister shot Queenberry because he had mistreated one of his daughters.

WORLD'S W. C. T. U.

The Executive Committee Settling Up.

BOSTON, Nov. 20.—The Executive Committee of the World's W. C. T. U. has been settling up the convention affairs. Mrs. Emmens, secretary of the lecture bureau, reported, noting the lack of interest in the speakers appointed by the bureau and requesting that the W. C. T. U. be more faithful to its own lecturers instead of supplying outside.

It was voted that \$50 be paid monthly to the Central Agency for the W. C. T. U. in the superintendency of Mrs. Grubb through the national treasury.

The department of purity has been under the direction of Miss Frances Willard, president of the national W. C. T. U., who has resigned in consequence of overwork, and Dr. Louise C. Purinton was appointed to all the place.

Hereafter the sessions of conventions will not continue later than 9:30 p.m., it being considered advisable that W. C. T. U. women be temperate in the matter of discussion. The traveling expenses of fraternal delegates will be paid in the future by the organization represented by the delegates.

Rev. Jacob Primmer to the Queen.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Rev. Jacob Primmer, minister of a Presbyterian church at Dundee, has written a long letter to the Queen in which he undertakes to give her Majesty a religious lecture. He approves of the Queen attending the Kirk while she is in Scotland in preference to the "corrupt Popish Episcopal worship." He asks for stronger support of the Kirk, and incloses for her Majesty's reading a number of tracts against the Church of Rome. The Queen's private secretary has returned the letter and contents to Rev. Mr. Primmer, saying her Majesty is unable to accept such works.

Love vs. a Crown.

VIENNA, Nov. 20.—An imposing ceremony took place at the Hofburg yesterday in the presence of the royal family, the ministers and cardinals and archbishop, the occasion being the formal renunciation by the Archduchess Louise, of Tuscany, and Prince Frederick Augustus of Saxony, of their titles to the throne prior to their marriage. In the evening a state banquet was given at the palace.

Whisperings of War.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 20.—The Department of Imperial Control reports that the present state of affairs in Europe fully warrants the large extra credits asked by the Minister of Marine.

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—The German War Office has ordered a large number of portable tents for the use of the Eastern army corps, with the view to the protection of the troops from inclement weather in the event of war with Russia.

THE WRECK AT PORT STANLEY.

Brave Conduct of a Life-Saving Crew.

Five Men and a Woman Rescued from Drowning—The Disaster at Goderich.

PORT STANLEY, Nov. 20.—Following are details of the disaster that occurred here Thursday morning: The schooner E. G. Benedict, which went ashore here, was consigned to J. C. Anthony, Erie Basin, Buffalo, and had a load of elm logs which she loaded at Smith's dock, west of Rondeau. After the schooner had laid under Rondeau Point during the gale of Tuesday night, she set sail for Buffalo, with the wind from the northwest. The captain expected the wind to go farther north and have smooth water rounding Long Point. However, at 12 o'clock Wednesday night the wind backed into the south-west and began to blow a gale, and he decided to run into Port Stanley. He made the light at 1 o'clock, shortened sail and headed for the light. At 2 a.m. on Thursday the sea had made so heavy, the schooner having been damaged while lying at Smith's dock was taking in water, so the pumps could scarcely keep her free, that by the time she reached the Port she would settle three feet in the trough. Just as she was about to enter the pier she struck the bottom, and losing her headway, broached and went to the star of the harbor, and now lies buried in the sand.

Capt. Wm. Berry, of the life saving station, at daylight saw a flag of distress flying on the schooner. The crew were up in the rigging, while the sea was breaking over the deck half way up the mast. He immediately got his crew together and successfully brought five men and a woman ashore. The names of the crew were: Capt. Thomas Lucas, owner and master, of Windsor, Ont.; Lewis Mercer, of Sombra, Ont.; George Franklin, of Detroit, Mich.; George Franklin, of River, Lake St. Clair, seaman, and Jessie Franklin, cook, same place.

The whole village and those who were rescued are loud in their praises of the hazardous undertaking of the life-saving crew. The schooner will, likely prove a total loss. No insurance.

GODERICH, Ont., Nov. 20.—The lifeboat has succeeded in reaching the large schooner at anchor off here. Its name is the Ed Kelly, bound from Keanan, Mich., to Cleveland, with a cargo of iron. The vessel is leaking and her forecastle is gone. Extra men have been sent out to assist the crew and also a supply of provisions.

The damaged vessel that was at anchor cannot be sighted this morning. A tug from here is now out searching for her.
