BOLD, BAD MEN.

Four of Them Rob a Texas Bank—A Battle in the Street.

LONGVIEW, Tex., May 23.—At 3 p.m. yesterday two rough-looking men walked into the First National Bank. One of them handed the following note to President Joe Clemmons:

Home, May 23.—In First National Bank, Longview, Texas, I would introduce to you Charles Speckmeyer, who wants some money and is going to have it. B. and F.

The bank cashier thought it was an important subscription to some charity, and started to donate, when the robber drew a Winchester from the folds of his "slicker" and told him to hold up.

The other robber rushed into the side wire door and grabbed the cash. Tom Clemmons and the other bank officials were ordered to hold up their hands.

The robbers hurriedly emptied the vaults, securing \$2,000 and a number of unsigned bills.

While this was going on two of the robbers were in the rear alley of the bank shooting at everyone who appeared, and being fired on by City Marshall Muckley and Deputy Will Stevens.

The firing made the robbers very nervous, and they hurried the bank officials and told them to run to the horses and to mount. This order was given so as to keep the citizens from shooting, but as bullets flew thick and fast the bank men were too loose and ran around the corner with several shots after them.

George Buckingham, citizen, was shot and killed. While he was down the robbers shot at him several times. City Marshall Muckley received a Winchester ball in the bowels. The ball glanced from his hand and he had in his pocket, which may save his life.

J. W. McQueen, a saloon-keeper, was shot in the body.

Deputy Will Stevens was not hurt, though he stood in short range and killed one of the robbers. The bankers all escaped unhurt, except T. E. Clemmons, who, in the scuffle with one of the robbers, got his hand in the hammer of a robber's pistol, which came down and cut a hole in his flesh.
