LONDON AND ENVIRONS

—The Lakeside arrived in Port Stanley
from Cleveland yesterday morning with
about 25 passengers on board.

—The children of the North End Pres-
byterian Mission were picnicking in
Queen's Park yesterday afternoon.

—The abusive language case of Mrs.
James Smith, of Pottersburg, against her
husband has been settled before Squire
Jarvis.

—The band concert by the Seventh last
evening in Victoria Park was as well
attended and successful as ever. Mr. W.
L. Blaikie's solos were well received.

—Edward Jury appeared before Squire
Lacey charged with forcing an entrance
into the house of John Schaefer, Center
street, London West. The case was settled.

—The annual retreat of the priests of
the diocese of London began at L'Assump-
tion College, Sandwich, last evening.
Bishop O'Connor and about 70 priests at-
tending.

—Walter Woolway pleaded guilty
yesterday to breaking into the postoffice at
Melrose and stealing about \$8 in stamps
and money. He will be sentenced on
Saturday by Judge Wm. Elliot.

—The parents of Emmet McLarnan, who
was recently drowned in the south branch
of the Thames, wish to thank the residents
in the neighborhood where the accident
occurred for their kindness and assistance.

—Crossley and Hunter, the evangelists,
leave Friday for Pelly Sound, where they
labor three weeks. They then take their
summer holidays. The evangelists have
just closed their tenth year of work.

—Those who have made any study of the
opium habit and its tremendous influences
for evil in the East should not fail to at-
tend the First Presbyterian Church this
evening at 8 o'clock to hear Rev. Jonathan
Gorlath, missionary to Honan, speak on
this subject. No collection; no admission
fee. A large audience should be there.

—Anyone who is fond of curiosities will
have a good chance of seeing some at John
Connor's, 238 Richmond street. An officer's
cavalry sword used during the rebellion of
1837 by Sergt. Anderson at Amherstburg
under Col. Askins, a musket ball, a brass
plate, which was picked up by a reporter
on the field of Waterloo after the battle,
and a few curious old coins are shown.

—The City Council meets tonight to
deal with the momentous question of the
tram franchise. A number of preliminary
private meetings have been held between
the council and the street railway company
in an endeavor to adjust matters—with
what result will be best seen when the mat-
ter comes up tonight.

—Thomas Hayes, a laborer, of Dor-
chester Station, has been arrested on a
diversion court summons. D. D. York and
James Woods, of the same place, obtained
judgments recently against Hayes for \$9.55
and \$28.24. He was ordered to pay the
amounts in monthly instalments, and on
refusing to do so was sentenced to ten days
in jail on each offense. The amounts have
nearly doubled since the judgments were
given.

—The Free Library Board met last night,
but owing to the delay that will be caused
by the issuing of debentures decided not to
consider the plans presented until a future
meeting. A large attendance will be urged.
A resolution was moved by Mr. E. R.
Cameron, and carried, requesting the
council to grant \$20,000 by special issue
of debentures for the purchase of a site and
construction of a building. If this is
granted the previous request for \$7,450 will
be withdrawn. Architects will be given
till Tuesday next to present plans. Messrs.
Henry Macklin (chairman), Robert Reid,
E. R. Cameron, George Burrell, James
Egan and Secretary Keene were present.

their eldest son, Mr. John George Rough-
ley, was united in marriage to Miss Sadie
Botterill.
