MISSIONARIES AT THE SEAT OF WAR

United States Secretary Gresham Says
They Will be Protected.WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Acting under
instructions from the executive committee
of the board of foreign missions of the
Southern Presbyterian Church, the Rev.
Dr. W. Bachman, its representative here,
has called on Secretary Gresham and the
Japanese charge to ask that measures be
taken to protect the missionaries of that
church in the east. Secretary Gresham
told Mr. Bachman that he did not think
there was any immediate danger to the
missionaries, but that they would be pro-
tected. At the Japanese legation the
reverend gentlemen inquired into the
status of the missionaries and was assured
that they were perfectly safe in Japan.The Southern Presbyterian Church has
less than a dozen missionaries in Corea,
and these, it is believed, can be accommo-
dated on board a United States man-of-
war should their lives be endangered.In China there are about 50, some few of
whom are in the northern provinces, and it
is regarding these that the board feels some
concern. They probably will be ordered to
Shanghai.

A Westminister correspondent writes:
The grasshoppers in the vicinity of West-
minster have done much damage. Some of
the oat fields are nearly stripped, and in
others more than half the oats are off the
stem. The turnips are being stripped by
them, and in some parts they are eating
the corn. The milk to the dairy factories
has gone down one-third. There they
think it is owing to the grasshoppers eat-
ing the pasture, while others think it is
caused by the horn fly mostly.

Foresters at Church.

The Ancient Order of Foresters of Lon-
don had their annual church service yester-
day afternoon. The members of the East
End Courts, about 200 strong, met at the
Forest City's hall, and headed by the
band of the First Hussars, marched to the
city headquarters of Forestry. There they
were joined by other local brethren, and
thence marched by way of Dundas street to
the Congregational Church, fully 700
members of the brotherhood being in line.The parade was viewed by hundreds
of spectators along the line of
march. Robin Hood Drill Corps, lately
inaugurated in connection with Court
Forest City, formed the main attraction.The uniform of this organiza-
tion is very showy, consisting of a dark
green coat, white trousers, long boots and
brown hat with three feathers—two white

Heroism of a Grandson of the Late Gen
L. E. Swan.H. Tilden Swan, a grandson of Gen. L.
B. Swan, late of New York, and a nephew of
Mrs. George H. Humphrey, of Rochester,
saved two female servants of Banker
Charles C. Baldwin, of New York city,
from drowning at Seabright, on the Jersey
coast, on Tuesday afternoon.The women, in company with Mr.
Banker's butler, were bathing on a bar at
some distance from the shore and remained
on the bar until the tide had risen and
made it impossible for them to return.Finding the waves became so high that
they were swept from their footing into
deep water. The butler could swim, and
made an effort to save one of the women,
who was not swept beyond his reach.Young Swan saw the danger while walk-
ing on the beach with his mother, and, tak-
ing off his coat, plunged into the water.With much difficulty he succeeded in
reaching the woman, who was struggling
alone and brought her to shore in safety.He then returned for the other woman, who
was being supported by the now thorough-
ly exhausted butler. He saved her also,
but when he returned for the butler he
found he had given up and had been swept
away. Swan returned to the shore almost
exhausted and was cared for by his many
friends who witnessed his heroism.The young man is also a grandson of
Henry A. Tilden and a grandnephew of the
late Samuel S. Tilden. Swan is 19 years
old.
