The Russians Spared No Soul

In Their Onward March in Manchuria.

Czar's Soldiers Cutting a Bloody Swath on Their Journey Through China—British Press Says "Hold on to Pekin"—The Diplomatic Struggle Proceeds While Dearth of Actual News Prevails.

London, Sept. 4.—The Kobe Herald of Aug. 14 says: "Russia is pouring tens of thousands of Cossacks from the north into Manchuria. Reports say no human soul is being spared, and a wide open track is being made as the troops press forward. They are nevertheless meeting some opposition en route, as the entire Chinese population come out against them."

DEARTH OF LIVE NEWS FROM PEKIN.
The latest reliable Pekin date is now nearly a fortnight old. An undated dispatch has been received at Vienna, reporting that the allied troops marched through the imperial palace Aug. 28, but it was known that this date had been fixed by the allied commanders for a formal promenade. There is no other news of any kind.

The Hong Kong correspondent of the Daily Mail says that the Canton officials have been ordered to transmit all possible revenue to the north for war expenses, and that all pay of officials from the viceroys downwards had been stopped during hostilities.

GERMANS WILL STICK.
The Vienna correspondent of the Standard telegraphs that he learns from a good source that the Germans, Austrians and Italians will remain in Pekin after the Russians withdraw. Shanghai and Hong Kong dispatches

express the utmost astonishment at the idea of evacuating Pekin.

BRITISH PRESS SUGGESTIONS.
The Daily News suggests, editorially, that Russia may have made secret terms with China behind the back of the powers.

The Standard expresses gratification at the explanation that the United States government does not approve Russia's proceedings.

The Daily Express publishes an interview with a New York Chinaman, Liu Chuah, now staying in London, who admits Li Hung Chang's duplicity and rooted antagonism to western ideas, but thinks that the allies have no choice but to negotiate with him or to retire from China altogether.

KEY TO THE RUSSO-AMERICAN MYSTERY.
M. De Blowitz, the Paris correspondent of the Times, asserts that the origin of Russia's decision to evacuate Pekin was her desire to frustrate the schemes of Emperor William and to correct the impressions produced by the Kaiser's speech, attributing to Emperor Nicholas the initiative in the appointment of Count Von Waldersee to the command of the international troops. "Russia also desired," says M. De Blowitz, "to save France from the hard necessity of placing her troops under Count Von Waldersee. The United States were also much dissatisfied with the prospect of their troops acting under German orders. If you compare the Russian evacuation proposals with the American plan for beginning of negotiations before Count Von Waldersee's arrival, and if you add to this the prompt adherence of France, addressed to the United States, you have the complete key to the Russo-American mystery."

SHANGHAI SURPRISED.
Shanghai, Sept. 4.—The reports from European capitals that Russia has decided to leave Pekin caused amazement here, when first heard through Chinese sources. Officials were especially inclined to treat them with incredulity, inasmuch as every step in connection with Russia's occupation had apparently been taken with a view to permanency. The theory was that in the railroad matter Russia held the key to the situation, and that when the Taku harbor was closed by the ice the other powers would be dependent upon Russia to provision their troops in Pekin. The officers of the other armies have constantly predicted that the Russians intended to keep the railway and to hold the line of forts and arsenals to Pekin, thus securing the strongest foothold of any nation. The assumption is that

possibly influenced Russia to her present decision. She has her hands full to maintain her troops, and part of the army has sometimes lacked proper rations.

BRITAIN MAY ACQUIRE.
London, Sept. 4.—The difficulty of communicating with the British minister at Pekin delays the promulgation of the views of the British Government in regard to its future steps in China, the government being unwilling to commit itself publicly to a definite decision until Sir Claude Macdonald shall have fully reported on the situation. While the heated anti-evacuation campaign continues in the press the trend of official opinion apparently continues favorable to the principle of suggested withdrawal of troops from Tien Tsin, but is not entirely certain in that the withdrawal of the troops from Pekin is the surest and quickest method to attain that end.

NOTHING FROM FRANCE.
Paris, Sept. 3.—France has not yet replied to Russia's note regarding the withdrawal of troops from Pekin. France regards peace as the first requisite of the situation, but is not entirely certain in that the withdrawal of the troops from Pekin is the surest and quickest method to attain that end.

IN GERMANY.
Berlin, Sept. 3.—Negotiations continue between the powers respecting the propositions of Russia. It appears that the portion of the proposal which contemplates the removal of the legations to Tien Tsin does not meet with opposition, but the proposal that the troops should vacate Pekin will not be acted upon until after thorough examination of the case by other powers, with a special view to the question of military advisability. Germany's programme is to await the action of the other powers.

One leading Berlin journal asserts that Emperor William, while conversing with a group of officers last Saturday evening, said: "Under no conditions shall we give up Pekin, nor even

A Washington dispatch of Monday says that up to date no definite responses have been received to the United States last communication to the powers on the subject of withdrawing troops from Pekin. It is stated that in all probability at least a week will be consumed in diplomatic exchange. If Russia does not yield to what appears to be the wish of nearly all the powers, and refrain from carrying out her purposes to withdraw from Pekin, the United States forces will be marched out. It is clearly the wish of the United States Government that the first of these lines of action shall be taken.

MORE EXECUTIONS.
Pekin, Aug. 20, via Shanghai, Sept. 3.—Three more members of the Tsung Li Yamen have been executed by the empress. They were put to death just before the arrival of the allied forces. There is no government in Pekin. The anti-foreign element all followed the flight of the court. Looting continues, and the Boxers, concealed in several different sections of the city still keep up a desultory fire. The streets are picked by the allied troops.

According to numerous reports, the many thousands of Boxers who were scattered on the arrival of the allies, are again massing to attack Pekin. These rumors create great uneasiness.

MUCH BUTTER.
The Japanese have captured 5,000,000 bushels of rice and silver bullion to the amount of \$2,000,000. At Tien Tsin the Americans have captured bullion to the value of half a million dollars.

Ching Shin, Na Tung and Chung Li, members of the Tsung Li Yamen, are trying to negotiate with the generals of the allied forces to prevent the destruction of the innermost palace of the former city. With the same result in view the Russians have occupied the palace.

RETRIBUTION DEMANDED.
Resident Americans hope that the negotiations will not succeed. They think Pekin ought to be completely destroyed, that Na Tung and Chung Li should be beheaded, since they formed part of the cabal which caused the murder of Baron Von Ketteler, and attempted to massacre all foreigners, and that no leniency should be shown or the next generation of Chinamen will repeat the crime.

The British forces met, five miles to the westward of Pekin, 500 Boxers and 2,000 regular Chinese troops. The latter fired without firing a shot, and the Boxers followed after losing 700 men.

Prince Chien is endeavoring to open negotiations with the allies.

TURNED OVER TO THE JAPS.
London, Sept. 3.—An Austrian official dispatch says Chung Li, who was arrested by the Austrian representative at Pekin, was military governor of Pekin, and adds that the Austro-Hungarian contingent is quartered in Chung Li's palace. After his arrest he was turned over to the Japanese.

20,000 CHINESE KILLED.
Denver, Col., Sept. 3.—Major S. J. Hooper, of this city, has received a letter from Lieut.-Col. C. A. Coolidge, dated Tien Tsin, China, Aug. 8, Lieut. Coolidge led the 30th Infantry in its attack on the inner walls of Tien Tsin. The letter gives an account of the fighting at Tien Tsin, and continues: "The Japanese looted the Chinese houses, but the French were entirely in the robber business, and robbed and murdered right and left, and do still. I believe the British were granted one day to loot, but this was soon stopped, except by the French, who still continued the work in their own quarter. The American quarters have been very quiet, and we guard as best we can with our small garrisons. The Chinese dead are all buried, and the town is cleared up and peaceable. There were 20,000 dead Chinese, and probably one-third of the city is burned by shot and shell or incendiaries. On account of the crowded condition of the city it would be a good thing if one-half of it were destroyed."
