Toronto, Feb. 8 .- In the course of him

interview with a delegation from the Ontario Sugar Beet Association, Premier Rose said a bill would be brought down soon and its terms made known. He did not know that the grant to be made would be so high as \$100,000, as had been asked for and suggested in several of the resolutions. The bonus could not be given direct to the farmer, but the government would safeguard the interests of that class. He thought they should provide for the factories paying the farmer \$4 per ton for beets for the first year of the period over which government aid was given, and after that \$4 per ton and pro rata for the amount of saccharine matter.
