DECLARES CHRIST NOT BORN A JEW SPERRY INSISTS MARINES BE ARMED

American Professor Starts Wordy War at Historical Congress in London.

Berlin, Aug. 18.—It remained for an American delegate to provide the principal theme of contention at the International Historical Congress, which has just concluded its session here. Professor Paul Haupt, of Baltimore, created a storm of discussion among German theologians by his address on "The History of Galilee," in which he only veiling his real subject, which was based on the question, "Was Jesus a Jew?" Professor Haupt answered this negatively, stating that Christ was not born in Bethlehem, according to the early Christian tradition, but in Nazareth. He contended that the assessment which necessitated Joseph's journey to Bethlehem occurred eleven years after Christ's birth.

After a succession of arguments, Professor Haupt put forward his own conclusion that it was improbable that Christ was a descendant of David. It was probable, on the other hand, that he was a descendant of the Aryan colonists of Galilee. Possibly if his genealogical tree could be traced far enough it would be shown that he was a descendant of Zoroaster.

It was at this point that a war of words ensued between Professor Haupt and the German professors. Professor Haupt's arguments were attacked in detail, and, perhaps because it was a question of one against numbers, he did not fare well. The leading German Biblical expert present expressed the pith of the German idea when he said it was impossible to decide scientifically whether Christ was a Jew by race. The point of importance was that Christ was unquestionably a Jew by religion. Such violent discussion was produced that the chairman's efforts to calm the controversialists were for a long time ineffectual.

GONE TO WEST.

Chatham, Aug. 20.—Homeseekers' excursions for the Canadian West during the past two days have taken nearly 500 young men from Chatham and adjoining points.

EX-SARNIAN DEAD.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 20.—George Schram, a native of Sarnia, Ont., for the past nine years instructor in Detroit University School, is dead. Mr. Schram was 46 years of age. He is survived by a widow, one son and a daughter. Interment will be in Sarnia.

Yankee Tars at Sydney Refuse to Land Under Any Other Conditions.

Sydney, N. S. W., Aug. 20.—There arose today a circumstance in connection with the parade of United States bluejackets and marines in Sydney tomorrow, which at one time promised to make impossible the carrying out of the programme as originally planned, but the matter has been adjusted, and the men will march in accordance with expectations.

The imperial regulations forbid the landing of armed men in Australia. This fact was communicated to Admiral Sperry, who in reply informed the Government that he would not allow his men to participate in the processions and reviews unless they came ashore armed. This was followed by a conference between Admiral Sperry and the Commonwealth Government, after which it was announced that the Government had granted permission for the American sailors and marines to land armed, but without ammunition.

This proviso was accepted by the admiral, and the programme will therefore be carried out unaltered. There were few official functions today, tomorrow being set aside for the public reception and the official landing. The spirit of cordiality and wholehearted welcome which fills the people of this city has found opportunity for expression in several minor ways.

This afternoon the admirals of the fleet and the captains of the various battleships came ashore and called officially upon Lord Northcote, governor-general of Australia, and Sir Harry Rawson, governor of New South Wales. Later the governor returned this official call.

HAMILTON MOURNS.

Hamilton, Aug. 20.—The city council last night passed a resolution of sympathy with the wife and family of the late Chief Clerk and also with relatives of Sergt. Cockburn and Fireman Wein. The flags of all city buildings are flying at half-mast. The death of Chief Clerk is the talk of everyone, and all speak well of him. "Clark was a hero," they say.

TROOPS LEAVING THE RIOT CITY STANDING OF THE CANDIDATES

Work of Preserving Order Has Been Turned Over to the Civil Authorities.

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 21.—Military rule ceased in Springfield today, the militia force here being reduced to one regiment, and the work of preserving order being turned over to the civil authorities. The first cavalry broke camp at daylight, and the Seventh Infantry patrols were withdrawn from the streets. Sheriff Wornor had an increased force of deputies on duty, and city police also were reinforced by a few special policemen. Except for the closed saloons, and the ruined homes and business houses in some of the streets, there was nothing to indicate that a week ago the city had been in the hands of an uncontrolled mob.

The early morning hours were practically without incident. The moonlit, moonlit shooting has practically ceased since the troops began to depart, the absence of the numerous patrols and sentries having seemingly eliminated the incentive to cause excitement by the firing of guns.

Rolla Keys, the boy witness, against the alleged assassin of Mrs. Mabel Hallam, who was shot accidentally by a companion yesterday, was in a satisfactory condition, according to early reports from the hospital today. No announcement has yet been made as to when the Seventh Infantry will be ordered home. This regiment was the strongest numerically in the capital. Its departure will depend upon the ability of the police and sheriff's forces to prevent further depredations.

The grand jury resumed its investigations today. It is understood that further charge against Abraham Raynor, who was made the subject of six indictments, were being considered. Raynor now stands formally accused of murder, malicious mischief and riot. The murder charge alleges that he took part in the lynching of William Donigan. The authorities also claim to have evidence that he was a ringleader in the raids upon the black belt, which followed the Loper riot, and resulted in the lynching of Scott Burton. Kate Howard, who was indicted for malicious mischief, and riot in four forms, was arrested on a bench warrant last night. Her bail has been fixed at \$10,000. The charges against her relate to the looting of the Loper restaurant.

Loper was a witness before the coroner's jury last night at the inquest in the death of Lewis Johnston, who was found lifeless in the basement of his restaurant. It developed that no autopsy had been held on the body, and none of the physicians who had viewed it, would venture a positive opinion as to the cause of death. The possibility that the boy was killed by falling into the basement and breaking his neck may cause an exhumation of the corpse.

EARL GREY'S OUTING

How He Will Be Entertained at Windsor, Walkerville and Detroit.

Windsor, Aug. 20.—The programme for the entertainment of Earl Grey, who will be in this city next Monday, has been arranged. The Governor-General will arrive on the Government steamer Speedy at 4 o'clock, after an automobile ride around Windsor, Warrenton and Sandwich. He will cross the river to Detroit, and through Detroit's famous Bell Isle Park. At 1 o'clock the party will board the steamer. The party will be accompanied by the Twenty-first Fusiliers will accompany the party.

MR. HARCOURT MAY RUN

Nominated as Liberal Candidate for the Commons From Haldimand.

Welland, Aug. 20.—Hon. Richard Harcourt, Welland, who was yesterday enthusiastically nominated at Cayuga as the Liberal candidate for Haldimand, for the coming election, today that, while he felt grateful at the spirit of the convention, yet he was unable, for private reasons, to state whether he would be able to accept or not. Mr. Harcourt's father, twice represented this constituency, and the nominee had in the Local House represented part of it for many years.

Mr. Harcourt's decision will be made public in a few days.

ATTACKED BY MADMAN

The Mayor of Hoboken, N. Y., Has a Narrow Escape From Death.

New York, Aug. 20.—Attacked by an insane man, armed with a knife, in his office today, Mayor Stell, of Hoboken, had a narrow escape from death, and was saved by the arrival of his bodyguard, a detective, at a critical moment.

William Carmondy, who was released from an insane asylum a few days ago, entered the office when the mayor was alone, and demanded pay for his time spent in the asylum. The mayor endeavored to temporize with him, but Carmondy whipped out a knife and started for him. The mayor jumped behind his desk, with the madman in pursuit, just as a detective entered the room.

After a desperate struggle, the mayor and detective disarmed and arrested Carmondy.

In the Honor Matriculation—Education Department Publishes the List.

The standing of honor candidates in the matriculation examinations was announced yesterday. In connection with the list the education department makes the following statement: "The figure after a subject denotes the class of honors taken in that particular subject, as, for instance, 'English II,' denotes second-class honors in English.

"The standing is given on the honor matriculation papers only, not on the papers for entrance into the faculty of education. The latter is purely and simply a passing examination for teachers' academic rank, and no university honor standing can be given on it by the educational department."

TWO SISTERS KIDNAPPED

Evans Girls Carried Off For a Ransom, It Is Supposed.

Kenosha, Wis., Aug. 20.—Unusual mystery surrounds the disappearance of the Misses Gertrude and Dorothy Belhn, who have not been seen by friends since their parents left them sitting in a hammock on the lawn at their home at 9 o'clock Monday night.

Jacob Belhn, their father, owns many broad acres and is counted one of the wealthiest farmers in Southern Wisconsin. For this reason many in the neighborhood believe the girls were kidnapped and are held for ransom.

Warning Note Is Received.

Another angle is given to the affair by the receipt by Mrs. Belhn, who is the stepmother of the missing maids, of a note several weeks ago warning her that a plot was on foot to steal the girls.

That there was a kidnapping is testified to by members of the household, who say that about 10 o'clock Monday night a closed carriage was driven up to the Belhn gate. It is declared that a man was heard sharply commanding the girls to enter and that they obeyed him. The horses then were whipped and the victims rapidly carried away.

The Belhn home lies between the towns of Paris and Somers. After an unsuccessful search by relatives and local authorities Mr. Belhn came to Kenosha today and engaged detectives to work upon the case.

Snake on Bryan Lawn

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 20.—A big bull snake, seven feet long, added to the interest of life at Fairview Sunday, by wriggling through the grounds in front of Bryan's house and trying to collect chickens.

Sunday's branch of the snake was things interesting for a small boy in the neighborhood, who made over a mile in 1:40, and broke Tetrazini's record for high notes.

Yesterday the snake became conceited over his successes and started to chase visiting Democrats off the lawn. His chosen victim was Peleg Bagg, of Walla Walla, Wash., who was just departing from Fairview, after assuring Bryan that the Pacific slope was going Democratic.

As Bagg descended the sloping walk from the house the snake wriggled out of the alfalfa fields. The highest places around there are two hills, and they were all that Bagg hit. He did not wait for the westbound train, but started out for Walla Walla on foot, going something less than 100 miles an hour.

FIRE AT TORONTO

Toronto, Aug. 20.—Fire of an unknown origin, with water, wrecked the great hardware of Rice, Lewis & Co. at the corner of King and Victoria streets early this morning, doing about \$200,000 damage.

The fire broke out on the ground floor at 5:15 o'clock. It crept to the elevator shaft, where it was caught by a heavy draft and shot up to the fifth floor, where it spread out and swept a jagged 30-foot hole through the roof. A general alarm was sent in and 75 firemen were soon at the conflagration, which was got under control by 8 o'clock.

One hundred and fifty are thrown out of employment.
