EIGHTH STRAIGHTIn a Hitting Match the Tigers  
Beat the Senators  
Once More.

Detroit, Sept. 30.—The Tigers made it their eighth straight by beating Washington once more. But with Cleveland also beating Philadelphia, they could not add to their lead, which still remains four points. Today they rest and Friday they open the battle against the west that will really decide the pennant, starting with St. Louis.

They took the last game against Washington by outhitting the Cantillon crowd. Donovan opened for the champions, but he was not at his best and withdrew after the sixth, after the Senators had done some clean, hard hitting. The smiler was not wild, and apparently had enough to get away with the game under ordinary circumstances, but Washington had a habit of hitting anything and everything. Mullin went in and finished, holding the visitors without a run. The Tigers hit him hard and often, and with errors helping in one round, were never troubled.

Tannehill was a little wild in the first round and Herman Schaefer came through with a clean hit that gave the champions a lead of two runs. The Senators got to Donovan in the next round, when he walked a man and Street and Tannehill doubled and singled respectively. In the third round, and Downs' two-base smash, set off four runs for the home hopes, and from then on they were never seriously in danger. They did get to Bill in the sixth for four hits and three runs, but he retired in favor of Mullin, and the game was saved.

Except for the hitting game was not a pretty struggle. Bush pulled off a few more of his star fielding plays. Schmidt caught well and the rest of the team played good defensive ball, but had very few hard chances.

McIntyre led off in the first inning with a clean single to center. Bush sacrificed. Crawford was walked. A double steal was tried, but Matty was nailed at third. Cobb was walked and Rossman filled the bases when McBride fumbled his grounder. Schaefer scored Cobb and Crawford with a sharp drive to center. This gave the champs a two-run lead to work on, but the Senators came back in their half of the third and tied it up.

Freeman walked with one out, and McBride fled to Downs. But Street doubled to left center, scoring Freeman. Tannehill's hit to right scored Street. The Tigers did nothing in their half, but came back in the third and clinched the game.

Crawford was hit and Cobb beat a foul. Street's throw to McBride caught Crawford off second got by the shortstop and both men moved up a base. Rossman was tossed out by Tannehill, but Crawford was held at third. Schmidt hit to Unglaub, who threw wide to the plate and Cobb followed Crawford. Schaefer made third and Schmidt second. Downs added two more when he hit past third for two bases and ooh men scored. Jerry was out trying to stretch his hit into a triple and Donovan lined to Tannehill.

In the fifth with one out, hits by Rossman, Schaefer and Schmidt filled the bases, but Downs fanned and Donovan grounded to the box. Then followed the inning that they got to Donovan.

Clymer beat his butt and Pickering doubled to left, scoring him. Freeman's hit to right sent Pickering to third. McBride went out to Rossman, and Street was thrown out by Donovan, who held Pickering at third. Tannehill singled to right and Pickering scored. Cobb's throw to the plate had Freeman beaten, but the runner collided with Schmidt, who dropped the ball and another run was added. Millan fled to Crawford, ending the hope of the Senators to tie the score.

The Tigers made their last run in their half of the same inning, when McIntyre walked, Bush sacrificed and Crawford singled to center. Mullin held the visitors safely in the remaining three rounds, but one scratch hit beat him off him.

GIANTS WIN AND  
GO BACK IN LEAD

Chicago Losing to Cincinnati,  
Throws New York at  
Top of List.

New York, Sept. 30.—With the local Nationals back in first place, the New York fans are jubilant. Today's game the last of the home series with Philadelphia, was won by McGraw's men, but once the visitors appeared dangerously near winning.

A fast double play robbed them of a run in the seventh, when Ames intercepted Donlin's throw at the plate and sent it to second, where Bridwell caught Shean, going to second, and shot the ball to the plate in time to head off Magee. Doornick's double Moore's single and McCormick's fumble gave Philadelphia a tally in the eighth.

The home team got both runs in the opening inning on a base on balls followed by Moore and Shean and a timely single by Devlin. The teams left tonight for Philadelphia, where they will play a double-header tomorrow.

Chicago, in the lead yesterday, is today in third position. Drop to this point is due to the victories of Pittsburgh over St. Louis and of New York over Philadelphia, while the champions were losing to Cincinnati.
