

The board of health yesterday discussed the Eva street drain, and decided to have it cleaned out, and the cost assessed against the property benefitted.

Medical Health Officer Hutchinson reported that the drain was a menace to health. There was a large amount of stagnant water lying in the neighborhood, and when the drain overflowed the water was forced into the cellars in the neighborhood, increasing the

Rev. Mr. Going and Rev. Mr. Birks to Attend Obsequies of Rev. Dr. Courtice.

Rev. Mr. Going, of Exeter, president of the London Conference, and Rev. A. K.
