SIDE LIGHTS ON
MANY SPORTSCOLLINGWOOD PROTESTS
AN ORILLIA PLAYER

Claims He Is Over the Age Limit, But
O. H. A. Files Show That the
Orillia Man Has One Year
To Go Yet.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—The Collingwood Junior Hockey Club has filed a protest with the O. H. A. against the Orillia Club, alleging that one of the Orillia players, Peter F. Thornton, is over the age limit. The Orillia Club say that Collingwood's information is all wrong, and that their mistake will cost them \$25 deposit fee, filed with their protest.

As a matter of fact, the official documents show that Thornton was born Oct. 22, 1893, and has still another year to play hockey in the junior O. H. A. In view of the circumstances, the third round game between Orillia and University of Toronto, scheduled for tonight and Monday, will be proceeded with as arranged. Collingwood has not as yet filed any evidence in support of the protest.

WILL OPPOSE THE JOHNSON-FLYNN BOUT.

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 8.—Promoters of the Johnson-Flynn prize fight will encounter official opposition to the proposal to stage the bout in New Mexico according to a statement made yesterday by Governor William McDonald.

Governor McDonald admits that he has no serious objection to properly conducted bouts, but adds: "If I can stop it I will not permit a contest between a white and a negro."

The governor recognizes that as a state New Mexico has no legal means of preventing ring battles, and declares that when the State Legislature convenes on March 11, he will submit a special message urging the enactment of an anti-prize fight law.

Tonight the visitors are being entertained at a smoker, and tomorrow they will get down to real play, when the second round of the Dingwall competition, which is virtually the grand challenge, will be started.

Winnipeg, Feb. 8.—The weekly bonspiel of the London Curling Club is becoming one of the curling events of the city, and the competition yesterday was no exception. As enthusiastic bunch of curlers as one would wish to see were gathered at the transportation building last evening, and a grand old time they had of it.

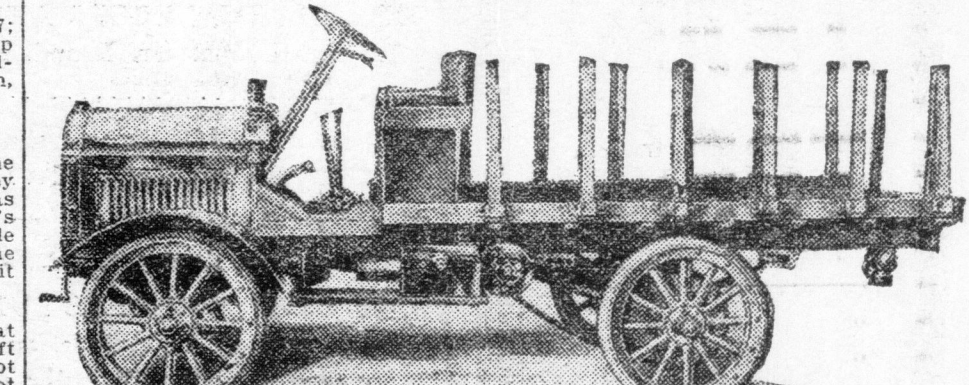
FINISH AT PETROLEA.

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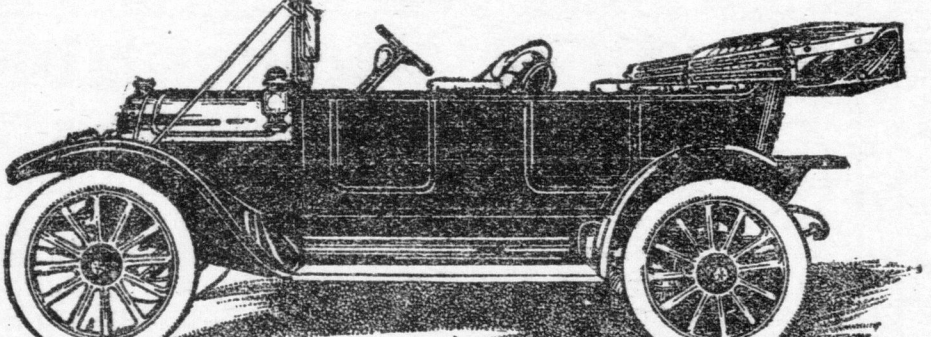
