CHELSEA GREEN LOTS ARE SELLING RAPIDLY

Twenty-Eight Lots on Which Workingmen's Homes Are To Be Built Sold During the Past Month—Mr. R. Franks Receives Offer of \$20,000 for 95 Acres.

Chelsea Green is still on the boom, land values in that section having doubled in the past few years. During the past few weeks 21 lots have been sold of the Robert Gracie estate, which was formerly a part of the Whetter estate, and as soon as possible the people who purchased them will start the erection of workingmen's homes. A number of new houses have been started already, and it is expected that before fall there will be enough to accommodate the workingmen of the factories over there.

Received Large Offer.
Mr. Richard Franks, who has a farm of 95 acres, has received several offers for it, but has not yet decided to sell. Last Friday a local man made a standing offer of \$20,000 for the place. If he secures it he will cut it up into building lots and put them on the market.

Factories Are Busy.
All the factories are working with as big a staff as they can secure, and it is expected that the Mitchell Co., which is the pioneer institution of the Green, will have to erect an addition to their plant before long. The company's plants and store yards, which cover an area of twelve acres, are filled with material, and it is expected that the factory will be completed within a short time.

Will Donate Two Acres of Land To the City For a Park
Mr. James Winslow Offers Piece of Property on River Bank—Residents of Green Want a Place of Recreation.

Residents of Chelsea Green are bound to have a park, and already several shady spots in that section have been suggested as available sites. They contended that it is too far for them to come up to Victoria Park on Sunday afternoons or evenings during the hot weather, and that they would be satisfied if the city would donate a few benches to be placed under the trees over there.

Offers Two Acres.
Mr. James Winslow has offered two acres of land, situated along the river bank, free to the city if he receives a promise that a little work will be done on it.

It is also understood that the owners of the "valley" property would give a section of the ravine, through which a creek runs and where there are a number of shade trees, if the city would consent to give a few benches and look after it.

The Green is growing considerably, and as practically all the residents are workingmen and their families, a few dollars spent in benches and flowers would provide a place of recreation after a hard day's work.

Tecumseh Avenue Residents Anxious About Pavement

Sent Petition for Cement Roadway to Council, But Nothing Has Been Done About It.

Residents of Tecumseh avenue, between the Wortley road and Ridout street, are wondering when the city council is going to take some action on the petition presented by them asking for a reinforced concrete pavement on the street.

The petition was circulated several months ago and sent to the council. Since then the residents have been watching the papers every day after a meeting of the council or the board of works to see whether instructions were given to begin work on the pavement.

"I cannot understand why it is being held up," said one resident. "The majority of property owners signed the petition. We are willing to pay for the pavement, and I think we should get it."

Several other petitions for pavements in South London have been circulated, one or two of them being sent to the city clerk, but as yet the residents have received no notification of any action.

Maitland Street Roadway Is In Bad Condition

Maitland street, between Simcoe street and the river, is in such condition that it is almost impassable. Deep ruts about and drivers of delivery rigs find it almost impossible to take their rigs over the street in some sections.

Numerous complaints have been registered by the residents, but they have yet received no assurance from the city that the roadway would be repaired. There is some talk of circulating a petition asking that the street be gravelled, but it is likely that it will be sent to the board of works within a short time.

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ASK MONEY IN BYLAW TO BUILD BREAKWATER

Front Street Residents Think People Should Vote on Wall For Them.

Residents of Front street are hoping that the city council will decide to construct a permanent cement wall to protect their houses and land from the river, every spring.

At the last meeting of the board of works, a petition signed by the owners of property on Front street, was presented, and on motion of Ald. Stein, the city engineer was instructed to make an investigation of the place and report back to the committee.

The residents are of the belief that a sum sufficient to cover the cost of the construction of a permanent wall should be incorporated in the bylaw asking for a sum of money to build the West London breakwater. They contended that a breakwater is needed there, and that instead of sending two bylaws to the people an amount sufficient to build both should be asked for in the bylaw.

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AGITATION FOR SUBWAY IS TO BE STARTED AGAIN

Residents Are Working On the Scheme and Will Circulate Petitions.

BENEFIT TO RESIDENTS

South Londoners are not at all pleased with some of the aldermen. Several months ago when the agitation for a subway under the Ridout street tracks of the Grand Trunk was at its height, several aldermen promised to bring the question up in the city council. Apparently those aldermen forgot their promises or else something cropped up to attract their attention, for none of them even mentioned the matter, either in committee or council meeting.

Working on Scheme.
But the people of South London have not forgotten about the subway, and several prominent residents are quietly working on the scheme.

It is a recognized fact that such a subway would prove a time-saver to the residents of that section in coming and going to work, by providing a route for street cars, over which they would not be delayed by railroad trains.

Then the fire department would be benefited considerably by the reduction of a steep hill, and the elimination of a possibility of being held up by trains.

It is understood that the Street Railway Company would be only too willing to run a line down Ridout street, if a subway were built under the Grand Trunk tracks, and that the Grand Trunk would be willing to pay a part of the share of the cost of a subway as it would eliminate the necessity of a watchman at that crossing.

The residents are quietly working on the question, and several petitions will be circulated all over South London asking the city council to take some action towards the building of the subway.

Knollwood Park Lights Will Be Turned on Soon

Although employees of the hydro-electric commission of the city have been engaged for some months in erecting poles and stringing wires for the street lights in Knollwood Park the power has not been turned on.

General Manager Claubitz said today that everything was in readiness to turn on the lights, but that the work was being held up on account of a delay by the Westinghouse Company in shipping the regulators for the lights in that district.

He thought, however, that the regulators would be here in a short time and as soon as they arrive they will be put up and the power turned on. The residents are anxious to have the power turned on as it is possible on account of the condition of the roads in that section and the lack of sidewalks.
