1,600 ARMY REMOUNTS

LEAVE FOR THE FRONT

352 of Them Purchased in

Western Ontario, Remain-

der in States.

Approximately 1,600 horses passed

through the city last night over the

Grand Trunk and C. P. R. en route

to Montreal, and consigned to over-

seas army service. One large ship-

ment was made up of animals from

Western Ontario. The remainder were

horses purchased across the border.

A Canadian Pacific military horse

train, special, with 312 of the best

specimens of horseflesh obtainable in this

part of Ontario, left the local yards

last night in charge of Conductor

Walter Wiley for Halifax, from which

port the animals will be taken aboard

a transport and dispatched to the scene

of action.

The train, 22 cars long, with sixteen

steeds in each car, will be rushed along

at express rate until it reaches the

end of the rail route. The best of ac-

commodation possible was given the

horses prior to the starting of the

train. A supply of feed was taken

along, and men, who have made a

study of the care of horses while they

were being shipped, were taken along

to look after the beasts until they are

safely landed across the sea.

Loading operations commenced late

yesterday afternoon, and the train

pushed out of the local yards shortly

after 3 o'clock.

Large Shipment From States.

Shortly after 5 o'clock last night two

trains of horses passed through the

Grand Trunk yards billed through to

Montreal. The first train carried 44

special horses and contained 704

animals. The second was made up

of 35 cars and carried 560. Railwaymen

stated that the animals were all fine-

looking specimens of medium weight.

The trains are running under rush

orders, and are being pushed through

to Montreal with as little delay as

possible.

INSPECTS LINE TO PORT

In Special Coach, Members Go

Over Entire System—

Steel Contract Let.

The London and Port Stanley

Railway commissioners yesterday

made a trip of inspection over the

whole system, leaving London in a

special coach at about 11 o'clock in

the forenoon and returning shortly

after 4.

The fact that all the culverts on

this line have been lowered two feet

in order to allow the farmers whose

land borders the track an opportunity

to farm into the Thames, was pointed

out and noticed with appreciation.

The commissioners also expressed

pleasure at the way in which the

new tracks have been laid.

The contract for steel standards for

the overhead work has been let to

the Canadian Bridge Company, of

Windsor, and the work will be got

under way as soon as possible.

COL. HODGINS LECTURES

PETER MCARTHUR HEARD

Tells Boyhood Experiences

To Library Inst. Members.

FOLLOW TREND OF TIMES

O. L. A. President Says Libraries

Must Broaden Out to Meet

Advancement.

"The public library is the finest in-

stitution with which I have ever come

in contact," said Peter McArthur, the

noted writer, speaking last night at the

annual Public Library Institute

meeting.

"The Country Boy and the Small

Public Library" was the subject dealt

with by the speaker, who spoke from

his own experience. In pointing his

declaration that the country librarian

could, with a little effort, shape the

character of the country boy, by

pointing out to him the best books to

read, Mr. McArthur showed how the

influence of a former Londoner, Alex-

Stewart, who resided on Oxford street

for some years, had helped the speak-

er in acquiring a literary taste, when

they both lived at Glenoe.

"Profane Literature."

Mr. McArthur was reared in a home

where Byron and Burns were consid-

ered profane literature. To his own

knowledge, McArthur said he had read

the Bible at least eight times, before

he was 15 years old. The Bible and

Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" he

read the only books he was al-

lowed to read up to that time. The

writer lived near Glenoe, in which

town Mr. Stewart was carrying on a

law practice. Often he slipped into

his friend's office, he said, with a

book of his own choosing, and received

useful counsel on the subject of proper

literature from Stewart.

"The Penny Dreadfuls" were not

nearly as bad as many of the books

in many of the public libraries," said

Mr. McArthur. In his estimation, too,

many books were carried by some li-

braries, which were not bad literature,

but were certainly of little good. They

left nothing useful in the reader's mind,

whereas, the penny dreadful always

ended with the downfall of the hero,

which the old-time reviewer would

have spoken of as showing infinite re-

search."

"However, it is possible to acquire a

taste for good books, and to fill the
