MAY NAME GOVERNOR
IN COUPLE OF WEEKS

Successor To Late Lionel Clarke Will Be Chosen Soon.

TORONTO, Aug. 29.—Ontario's new lieutenant-governor should be named within two or three weeks, if custom is followed.
The necessity for the vice-regal signature of Government orders and official documents makes impossible any delay in appointing a successor to the late lieutenant-governor.
While as a result of the death of Mr. Clarke some thousands of unsigned documents bearing his name and initials will have to be destroyed, it is said at the Parliament Buildings that nothing of great importance will be held up in the two weeks necessary to appoint a successor.
Automatically the commission of Sir William Mulock as administrator expired with the death of the late lieutenant-governor, and in the interval before the appointment of a new official Government orders and documents will have to wait for formal acceptance.

TOLMIE IMPRESSED BY DEPREDEATIONS OF THE CORN-BORER
Minister of Agriculture Plans More Active Campaign Against Pest.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—By Canadian Press.—Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, has just returned from a trip through southwestern Ontario. He was greatly impressed with the serious situation caused by the depredations of the European corn borer, an insect which was first discovered in Canada a year ago. Although since the discovery of the pest active measures for its suppression have been taken by the department of agriculture, it was quite evident to Mr. Tolmie that more vigorous action must be taken. Some fields of corn visited by the minister were found to be completely ruined, so far as grain production was concerned, and of very small value for forage.
Dr. Tolmie set to work this morning to speed up preventive operations. In the first place a new leaflet of instruction as to how to combat the pest has been prepared for wide distribution throughout Western Ontario. It will be in the printers' hands in a day or two.
Extra scouting groups, whose duty it is finally to locate all the affected areas, have been sent out, and the use of three more cars has been authorized in order to facilitate inspection.
The depredations of this insect are regarded as a most serious menace to the Canadian corn crop.

FAIR GRAIN YIELD AROUND HYDE PARK
HYDE PARK, Aug. 29.—Harvesting is practically finished in this district and many farmers are busy with preparations for their fall work and with threshing. The grain, with the exception of oats, is turning out a good yield. Farmers all through this district will attend London Fair and are making preparations for going.

Mrs. William Cudmore, Seaforth; Henry and Russell of Walkerville, and George of Seaforth.

ACCPA OF BURGEONLANDS CAUSE OF FIGHT
Hungarians Are Opposing the Advance of Austrian Troops.

VIENNA, Aug. 29.—The Austrians have met with resistance from the Hungarians in the occupation of Burgenland, the little strip of West Hungary awarded Austria by the peace treaty, according to reports reaching Vienna.
Late Sunday night Lieut. Hejjas, one of the recalcitrant leaders in West Hungary, appeared heading a large detachment of his irregular forces, seized the railway station at Odenburg and filled the streets with bands of uniformed men armed with sticks.
One detachment of 170 men advanced to Pinkafeld where they met with hand grenades and machine guns the Austrians who were coming in to take over the territory.
Allies With Them.
It is said allied officers marched with the Austrian troops when the attack was delivered by the Hungarians.
A demonstration by the Austrians in the possession of Odenburg, the occupation of Burgenland. The Czechs are known to have concentrated a detachment on the frontier near Presburg, and other forces along the Hungarian border.
The movement of occupation has been suspended since Herr Schober, the Austrian chancellor and foreign minister, is appealing to the inter-allied representatives here to fulfill the terms of the treaty giving Burgenland to Austria. As far as is known, the frontier troops in the territory are a few hundred Italians.
The events in West Hungary have caused the great anxiety and apprehension here. Communication with Odenburg is cut, and it is reported that the railway has been torn up.
Details are lacking as to the exact situation, but it seems apparent that insurgents are in possession of Odenburg. Conflicts between insurgents and Austrian gendarmes are reported from Friedburg, Hardburg and other frontier towns. It is asserted that Lieut. Hejjas, Colonel Lehar, another of the leaders, and Baron Prossy, commander of the battalions of "White Terrorists," have placed their adherents through Burgenland dressed in civilian clothes.
A rumor here is to the effect that allied troops from Silesia have been summoned by the allied commission, and also that the workmen of Wiener Neustadt are organizing to go to the assistance of the Austrian soldiers at Odenburg.

Makes Protest.
This afternoon following a cabinet council Herr Schober made a direct protest to the inter-allied officials in Paris.
The Hungarian minister sought an interview with Herr Schober today in order to offer an explanation of the situation. This was refused him.
The Austrian Government has been unable to communicate with its representatives at Odenburg since Sunday night. All the Austrian forces have been withdrawn across the West Hungarian frontier.
The casualties, according to the latest reports, apparently will not exceed twenty.
It is rumored that the Jugo-Slavs may occupy Baranya, on the Danube, unless Burgenland is immediately evacuated by the Hungarian insurgents.

HAS BEEN EVACUATED.
BUDAPEST, Aug. 29.—West Hungary has been evacuated, with the exception of the Podersdorf section, which is being held as a pawn to guarantee Hungary's claims against Austria.
It is rumored here that after the withdrawal of the Hungarian troops the irredentist bands formed with a view to preventing Austrian occupation of the territory. The newspapers and the public in Budapest are completely in the dark as to what is occurring in West Hungary.
The little strip of West Hungary turned over to Austria by the peace treaty has an area of about 1,700 square miles and a population of about 350,000. By its addition to Austria it is expected to supply that country with fairly large quantities of foodstuffs. The order of transfer of the territory created great indignation among the Hungarians. Under its new ownership it was to be known as Burgenland.

RECORD CORN CROP IN COUNTY OF KENT
Finest Yield in Years Is Now Being Harvested.
BLENDHEIM, Aug. 29.—One of the finest corn crops in a number of years is now being harvested in part of Kent County. The corn is especially well-earled and is getting ripe. A number are beginning to cut.
Beans are coming along nicely and the crop gives good prospects. The warm weather is just what is needed to ripen the fodder.
The peach growers have begun their harvest, the standard varieties, Profitable and Libertas, are being picked this week. The crop is not a heavy one, but the whole, a very few growers have a good quantity of splendid quality. The price per bushel is around \$3.
The harvest is early this year.

SAYS OIL BOOM IS LIKELY IN ALBERTA
MONTREAL, Aug. 29.—That there may be an oil boom in this country of unprecedented proportions is part conclusion of a detailed report on oil operations in Alberta and the Northwest Territories received today by Capt. E. J. Edwards, senior British trade commissioner here, from the Winnipeg branch.
The operations of the Imperial Oil Company take a major part in the report, and the conclusion is that "there is little doubt that the arrival of further important news from the North at the end of the present summer and the finding of more oil within the province of Alberta will be the signal for an oil boom of unprecedented magnitude."

THE TEA MARKET.
In a letter received from the London, Eng., office of the Salada Tea Company, the information is given that some tea was being sent to Germany, Poland and Russia. It looks as if Russia would take quite a steady quantity of common tea, for financial arrangements seem to be working satisfactorily.

TRADE REVIVAL IS SEEN IN WALES
LONDON, Aug. 29.—South Wales' trade revival is heralded by the opening of the famous Ebbevale steel works, after several months of stoppage. Eight thousand workers have been taken on in the tinplate works and other branches of the industry are also reopening. Baldwin has secured an order for 170,000 tons of steel rails for China.

LONDON KIWANIAN TO SEE BALL GAME DETROIT TOMORROW
Score of Local Members Will Visit Border Brethren.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 29.—The KIWANIAN, with their brethren of London and the Border Cities, have arranged a program of festivities during their stay abroad on Wednesday that will keep them going until their return to the homelands on No. 14 M. C. R. train.
The company, made up of 35 of St. Thomas and 20 from London, with some non-KIWANIAN chaperones, will be joined by 80 members of the Windsor club and 20 members of the Detroit club will occupy reserved and cushioned seats in the game between Cleveland and Detroit.

HOG PRICES DROP TO \$10 AT WOODSTOCK

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 29.—The price of live hogs took a decided drop on the local market today. All last week the buyers were paying \$12.25 per hundredweight, despite the fact that the price in Toronto was lower. Today, however, found the farmers who brought their hogs in much surprised when the price was announced at an even \$10 per hundredweight, with a promise of a further cut next week. Calves were quoted today at 5 to 7 cents a pound.

MANY APPLICATIONS FOR GOVERNORSHIP OF WOODSTOCK JAIL
Returned Soldiers, Retired Farmers and an Alderman Seek Position.

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 29.—It is now nearly two years since Oxford county jail had a governor. The Provincial Government, on the death of Charles Wilson, appointed Sheriff McGhee to fill the position. With him at the jail were John Robley and James Clarke. Following the escape of Norman Garfield in May last, Robley was relieved of his duties, and George Topley was added to the staff, with the position of governor.
Practical applications have been pouring into the Hon. Mr. Nixon, but no word of a move to appoint a governor was made until today, when Hon. Mr. Nixon and Inspector Dunlop of the department of prisons and charities, visited the city and received personal applications from several persons. There was no dearth of applicants, and retired farmers, returned soldiers, mechanics, and even a local alderman, died into the courthouse to personally apply for the position of governor of the castle. No promises were made by the two Government representatives, but it is expected a decision will be reached soon. With the North Oxford by-election on shortly, much interest is being taken locally in the appointment.

He is also charged with violating the liquor law. Police say that they seized on his premises 72 cases of Labatt's ale and more than 14 cases of rye whiskey.

RELIEF WORK FOR STARVING RUSSIANS IS WELL UNDER WAY
Soviet Authorities Offer First Mortgage To Secure European Loan.

RIGA, Aug. 29.—Actual relief work for the starving of Soviet Russia by the American relief administration was well under way today.
The first food shipment of six hundred tons of rice and sugar for the children at Moscow arrived in Riga from Danzig today on board a chartered German vessel.
Two more relief administration parties started from here for Russia tonight. The first was led by C. H. Bowden, who was recently stationed at Budapest and he will have charge of the relief work at Petrograd. The second party includes Oliver G. Burland, who was recently at Vienna; Dr. Golder of Leland Stanford University, and J. Rives Childs of Langburg, Va., who will reinforce the Moscow staff.
20 Fed 10,000.
Dr. Fridtjof Nansen and a party of companions returned today from Moscow, and he is going to Paris to endeavor to raise £100,000 in the form of European government loans to aid in the famine relief. Dr. Nansen said the first effect under the agreement with the Soviet authorities would be the feeding of 10,000 children in the Saratoff area, under the auspices of the Save the Children Fund. Moreover, he said, the Soviet Government is placing credit, to the amount not yet known, at his disposal for the purchase of a quantity of seed rice in the Baltic states and in East Prussia.
Dr. Nansen declared that he was impressed by the earnest desire of the Soviet Government to devote its full energies to overcoming the present distress. He was of the opinion that if Russia were freed from the isolation in which she finds herself the country would be able to take a full part in the united action to mitigate the misery which he said was affecting no less than 35,000,000 Russians in the Volga region.
Offer First Mortgage.
The Soviet authorities have offered Dr. Nansen a first mortgage backed by all the Russian assets, as security for the loan which he is trying to raise among the European Governments for famine relief work in Russia. It is understood that it also has been agreed to take up later the question of recognition of the old Russian debts.

FORGED CHECKS FOR \$3,500 PAID BY BANK
TORONTO, Aug. 29.—Manager D. A. Cameron of the Canadian Bank of Commerce says that the amount stolen from his bank here on Saturday by means of forged checks was \$3,500, not \$35,000. Two checks were presented to the paying teller, one for \$3,500 and the other for \$900, and both were marked "accepted," and marked with the initials of the ledger-keeper. Both the stamp and the initials were forgeries. Mr. Cameron said the suggestion that the fraud was an "inside job" was not seriously considered by the bank.
