MARRIES TWICE WITHIN 17 DAYS

Son of Millionaire Pittsburg
Furniture Maker Sought
by Two Wives.

BOTH HOLD CERTIFICATES

Attorney For Second Mrs.
Joseph Donald Grafton Seeks
Indictment.

NEW YORK, April 6.—Exactly 17 days after he married Ellen Curley McIntyre in Youngstown last November 28, Joseph Donald Grafton, son of a millionaire Pittsburg furniture manufacturer, married Peggy Davis, 17-year-old dancer in the "Follies" in New York.

This became known when both "wives" produced their marriage certificates here, following a dramatic visit by Mrs. Grafton the first to the sanitarium where the second Mrs. Grafton lay critically ill. Joseph C. Bickel, attorney for Peggy, said he would go before the grand jury this afternoon and ask for an indictment against Grafton on the charge of bigamy.

Have Not Met.

The two Mrs. Graftons have not met. Mrs. Grafton the first, told her story to "Peggy's" mother because "Peggy" was too ill to be informed of the marriage mixup. Grafton met his Youngstown wife when she was a bookkeeper in his father's Pittsburg office. They were married by B. J. Rosensteel, a Youngstown justice of the peace.

Don Grafton is a "Bluebird," says the first Mrs. Grafton, who believes he has still another wife living in a New England city.

"Every day he was on his honeymoon with Peggy he wrote me the most loving letters. The third day after I married him, I read an advertisement in a weekly publication within which a woman, whose name was given, asked that Joseph Donald Grafton of Pittsburg, husband of her daughter, be located, as his wife was seriously ill.

Claims Mistake Made. "Donald said it was all a mistake. I believe this woman's daughter may be Polly Lorraine, a chorus girl, who threatened him with a breach of promise suit.

"Ever after he put Peggy in the hospital, when he knew her life was in danger, he wrote, telegraphed and telephoned me. He begged me to go to Wilkesbarre with him. But I suspected something was wrong and I refused to go. He had the nerve to mail me letters from Troy, where he went on his honeymoon with Peggy. He had me send mail addressed to him to the place where he was living in New York with Peggy and her mother."

Representatives of both wives today are seeking Grafton, whose whereabouts is unknown. Last Thursday he is said to have entered secretly the apartment he and "Peggy" occupied here and removed all his effects. Before that he had been writing to "Peggy" and her mother from points in Pennsylvania, telling of his struggles to obtain sufficient money to pay for "Peggy's" sanitarium treatment.

REDUCE NUMBER RECEIVING HELP

Brantford Authorities Report Lessening of Those on List from 800 to 100.

RED CROSS FUNDS LOW

"Y" Youths Plan Big Bicycle "Hike" to Detroit on Good Friday.

BRANTFORD, April 6.—During the winter there have been as many as 800 persons on the relief list in the city. Officials were very pleased today when it was announced that at the present time there was less than 100 on the list. At tomorrow's meeting of the relief committee it is likely that steps will be taken for giving out relief as a civic undertaking. It is noteworthy that some of the men have taken the value in milk, as they have had their grocery allowance cut \$1, and had a dollar's worth of milk instead for the kiddies. Word has been received by Dr. W. L. Hutton, M.O.H., that the funds of the Red Cross Society have become so low that the distribution of milk and eggs through the social service nurses will have to be discontinued. Children of the present school age and often mothers have been benefited by this distribution for some months, and the discontinuance of the milk, is to say, the least regrettable.

Port Huron and Sarnia have been added to the itinerary of the big bicycle "hike" being planned by the members of the "Y" Outing Club. It was intended originally to make the ride direct through to Detroit, with several stop-overs, and then return via the same route. Instead, however, the "Hikers" will travel around the western shore of Lake St. Clair, and pedal through Marine City, Algona, and other border towns on the American side. It is stated that about a dozen lads will make the trip, which will commence on Good Friday.
