With the third and final installment of this year's taxes due a month from today. City Treasurer James Bell reports that there are no more arrears than usual. Citizens are finding money to pay their taxes, and there is no pessimism in city hall circles over the manner in which payments

are being made.
"Business and income payments are always the slowest to come in." commented the city treasurer. "The ordinary householder, if he has the money at all, is usually quick to re-spond to tax notices."

Collecting of income taxes is some-

times fraught with difficulties that are hard to overcome. Young, unmarried men, moving often from city to city, evade payment of taxes when-ever possible. However the collection department sometimes runs down evaders even to remote sections of the United States.

Get the Habit.

"There are some people who get into the habit of evading bills of all sorts as long as the law permits them." Mr. Bell says, "and in sidestepping tax notices they are just as adept as in other lines. F. J. Glackmeyer, Sergeant-at-Arms For 56 Years, Dies Sunday.

The death in Toronto yesterday of Frederick Joseph Glackmeyer, for 56 years sergeant-at-arms of the Ontario Legislature, will recall to many citizens memories of the days when Mr. Glackmeyer lived in London. A former alderman of this city, and possessing friends here, his passing will cause regret among those who

remember him as a young man. It was in the early seventies that Mr. Glackmover received his appointment as sergeant-at-arms in the Ontario Legislature. The position was given him through the influence of the late Sir John Carling, whom Mr. Glackmeyer had consistently supported in politics. At his death he was the oldest dignitary holding that was the oldest dignitary holding that position in the British Empire, and, because of long service, received the Order of the Imperial Star from King George in 1916.

Mr. Glackmeyer's youth was spent in this city at the old Glackmeyer homested your convention to the Company of the Company o
