VOTES TO ABOLISH VATICAN EMBASSY

With Large Majority Deputies
Back Herriot's Anti-Rome Policy.

Paris, Feb. 2.—Suppression of the French embassy to the Vatican was voted by the Chamber of Deputies this evening, 314 to 250. It was the realization of part of the program upon which the left groups of Radical Socialists were elected May 11, and which Premier Herriot, refusing to accept advice from self-termed well-wishers or bitter criticism from his avowed political opponents, carried through with firm determination "for the interest of France."

The chamber's party stood out well defined, the majority following M. Herriot solidly.

The premier pacified the opposition of the Alsace-Lorraine deputies by giving an official undertaking that a diplomatic agent would be maintained at the Vatican to represent the republic, but he refused to accept the suggestion of Georges Leygues, former premier, and Abbe Lemire, the latter speaking, "not as a Catholic priest, but as a Radical deputy," who begged the premier to reconsider his decision before it was too late.

COMRADE RISKS LIFE TO SAVE EXPLORER HELD FAST IN CAVE

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 2.—Pinioned face downward in a dim recess of Sand Cave, with waters rising about him and shell rock showering down, Floyd Collins clung to a faint hope of emerging alive today, after more than three days' imprisonment.

With him was a comrade, risking life to keep the falling particles of rock from the trapped man, while a pneumatic drill was dragged across country from Cave City to the narrow slit near the Mammoth Caves in which Collins is caught. The latter's foot still is imprisoned beneath a rock and efforts to chip this away result in showers of stone.

Collins' brother has offered \$500 to a surgeon who will descend into the cavern, 80 feet underground, administer an anesthetic and amputate the crushed leg.
