

DIET CAN BALANCE WHITE BREAD EVIL

Whole Wheat Product Is
Healthier, Dr. W. H.
Hill Asserts.

To the average man who eats a fairly well mixed diet, white bread is not a danger, in the opinion of Dr. W. H. Hill, dean of the Institute of public health. On the other hand, he admits that white bread lacks certain things which are found in whole wheat bread. He puts it this way: "It is not that white bread is in itself a dangerous thing to eat, but that certain salts and the vitamins which are, of course, essential for the proper nutrition of the body, are lacking. If you are eating a properly mixed diet you will get these salts and vitamins in other things."

Dr. Hill does not agree with Dr. H. T. Crossley that white bread is one of the chief causes of constipation, although he says that it is bread was to be practically the only diet of people, or one of the main things, white bread might have this tendency.

327 INDIGENT SICK CASES ARE REPORTED IN 1924

During 1924 there were 327 indigent sick cases reported to the city health authorities, and all but 96 of these were admitted to hospitals and sanatoriums. According to the annual report of Dr. W. S. Downham, medical officer of health, 177 indigent sick cases were sent to Victoria hospital, 17 to St. Joseph's hospital, 21 to the Queen Alexandra sanatorium, 22 to the preventorium, and 90 cases were reported to which hospital treatment was not thought necessary.

During December there were 32 indigent sick cases. Of these 15 were men, 7 women and 10 children. Eighteen were sent to Victoria hospital.

CANINE ASSOCIATION PLANS BANNER YEAR

Program Is Outlined at Well
Attended Meeting Held
Last Night.

At a well-attended meeting of the London Canine association, held in the club rooms last night, the program for the year was outlined, and plans completed for what promises to be the most successful year in the history of the organization. Compiling with the wishes of the Western Fair association, with which the club is closely allied, it was decided not to have too many evening shows throughout the year, and for 1925 only one evening show will be held under the club's sanction. The date for this show is set for Jan. 22 and will be held in the downtown district. Jack Waggett of Toronto was selected as judge of all breeds for this contest.

The big business of the year, that of conducting a show under the rules of the Canadian Kennel club in the spring, was gone into in detail, and the dates of the show definitely set as May 4 and 7. Judges of international reputation will be selected.

At the evening show to be held this month the usual classes have been added for young puppies, and special classes provided for the novice exhibitor and the one-day man.

The London canine association is one of the oldest in Canada in the Dominion of Canada.

FIFTY ANIMALS SUFFER PAINLESS DEATH IN MONTH

A bill just received from Inspector George Tustin of the London Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals shows that there are 42 fewer dogs and 188 fewer cats in London than on Dec. 1. Dogs and cats that number, injured on the streets or rendered homeless through neglect, were killed, painlessly, by the society during December.

The itemized account of each dog and cat destroyed shows the city's share of the bill to be \$14.80 for the dogs and \$5.60 for the stray cats.

BASKETBALL IS POPULAR AT EAST END TOWN HALL

The east end town hall is being used almost nightly by basketball teams and other organizations. With the commencement of the winter series of the London Ladies Basketball league next Tuesday, accommodation will be taxed. In this league there are twelve teams, and many games will be staged.

The opinion was expressed that since the heads of departments, Inspector-Administrator V. K. Greer, M.A., Principal E. A. Miller, M.A., of the collegiate institute, and Principal H. B. Beal of the technical high school, would be in touch with the executive committee constantly, any little difficulties encountered in the working out of the new administration, could best be ironed out by that committee.

The original survey committee was composed of Trustees A. E. Cairns, cross, chairman, G. F. Copeland, W. N. Manning, B. N. Campbell, and A. J. Grant.
