OLEANS, Oct. 10.—The commander-in-chief of the 15th army corps sends the following report to Gambetta, Minister of War at Tours:—About 9 o'clock this morning, at Artenay, where there was a brigade of lorguille and several companies of chasseurs, we were attacked by a considerable force of the enemy, who succeeded in occupying the place. General Rogan went to the assistance of the French forces, with 5 regiments, 4 batteries, and a battery of 8 guns. After fighting till 3 o'clock in the afternoon our troops were repulsed into the forest, which retains and still defend at any cost. The Prussians surrounded us.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—A correspondent of the *Telegraph* says the Prussians, on leaving Malhouse, fired on the people, killing and wounding several.

Advices from Metz on Sunday say failing from the works in a garrison maintained Munition stores, drums, uniforms, &c., are passed.

The Prussians took 2000 prisoners in the last encounter. Many Prussians were wounded.

It is stated that Lord Lyons recently suggested to Bismarck, the expeditionary armistice. Bismarck replied, "I would rather world prefer to make a peace at any time and anywhere, but no opposition looking to France would be entertained for a moment."

Tours, Oct. 11.—Reynolds and May, who have arrived here to corroborate the reports of the situation in Paris by Gambetta, Gambetta has descended at Greve, and for a long time was so close to the earth that it was said he was wounded. Gambetta was wounded the head and another tall went through the helmet. Both balloonists fortunately landed near Amiens.

Nothing has been heard from Paris for a day or two.

It is reported that Garibaldi will take his forces into Vosges to operate against the Prussians.

It is reported to-day that fighting was re-

sumed near Orleans.

The people of Tours are expressing indignation at the course of the authorities in not seeing that the 15th corps was properly reinforced. The scene of the battle—which occurred yesterday near Artenay is only 3 hours' ride by rail from the city, and here are collected several thousand troops, infantry, cavalry and artillery. The public are painfully impressed because these troops were not immediately forwarded to assist in the fight.

Bourbaki has been summoned to duty to give an account of his recent conduct. He is charged with having left his post to visit England.

Count Palizzi has offered his services to the Republic.

The Monitor publishes communication from the prefects of different Departments of France now under control of the Prussians, giving details of the shocking scenes committed by the Prussians in their endeavor to raise contributions where the people have been impoverished by former requisitions.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Twelve French ironclads passed Dover to-day bound East.

Garibaldi has exported the people of Nice and Savoy to discontinuous strife, at present it does so good and only embarras the French in their struggle against the Prussians.

Tours, Oct. 11.—Another body of Prussian prisoners has arrived here, sent from London; Oct. 11.—King William has received Versailles from the payment of 400,000 francs, which had been levied by the Prussians, now to be exacted by the French.

A squadron of Prussian Hussars was attacked on the night of the 7th through the treasury of the inhabitants of Villeneuve, which was afterwards burned by the Prussians as a punishment. Numerous bodies of French have since been suspended in this neighborhood.

The villages north of Paris which were deserted on the approach of the Prussians have been reconquered.

Tours, Oct. 10.—It is understood here that a battle is imminent near Artenay, and the French have returned there before and the French have crowds of volunteers and recruits from the South.

London, Oct. 10.—Dispatches from Berlin to the Manchester Examiner say, Bourbaki is fighting his way to Belgium, & to demand the release of the people of Lyons.

Gov. Government is fully satisfied of the good faith of Gen. Bourbaki.

London, Oct. 11.—The Times has an article to prove that Bismarck's original policy was to render France powerless for offence or defense.

Tours, Oct. 11.—The Minister of War has published the following telegram from Ostend:

"At a late hour last evening a great battle was fought to the west of the city, that the Prussians were repulsed and driven back into the suburbs. The Prussians are near Gafrein. Troops drawn from Tours to reinforce 15th corps formed in junction with that body near Artenay. Severe fighting was renewed before St. Quintin.

London, Oct. 11.—Prince Napoleon, who recently arrived in this city is actively plotting for the restoration of Bonaparte's empire. He declines to sanction the scheme himself.

Tours, Oct. 12.—Garibaldi will not take the field at present. His health is quite delicate and he will require a season of rest before engaging in active operations, as he has done.

Paris, Oct. 12.—Advices from Paris to the 10th inst represent the people as steady, orderly and quiet. Without any anxiety on the question of food they claim to be fully prepared for an assault.

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
