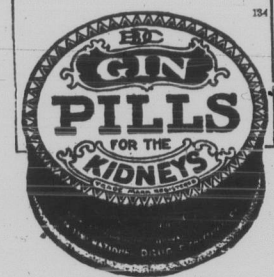

MISS METZLER'S GRADUATING RECITAL WAS A SUCCESS

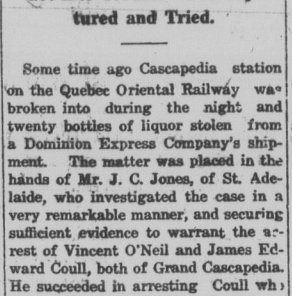
There Was a Large and Appreciative Audience in Beethoven Hall.

LIGHT SENTENCE FOR STEALING LIQUOR

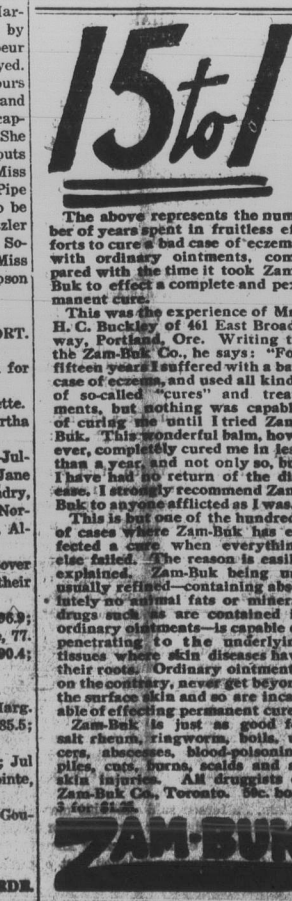
Grand Cascadia Young Men Get into Trouble—One Captured and Tried.



Some time ago Cascadia station on the Quebec Oriental Railway was broken into during the night and twenty bottles of liquor stolen from a Dominion Express Company's shipment. The matter was placed in the hands of Mr. J. C. Jones, of St. Adelaide, who investigated the case in a very remarkable manner, and securing sufficient evidence to warrant the arrest of Vincent O'Neill and James Edward Coull, both of Grand Cascadia. He succeeded in arresting Coull who appeared in court at New Carlisle on April 6th and was sentenced to three months imprisonment with hard labor. The Judge took a very lenient view of the matter, because Coull confessed, giving full details of how the robbery was carried out, also admitting that while he did not actually enter the company's premises he assisted O'Neill in carrying away the liquor. It was very fortunate for Coull that he decided to make a full confession because otherwise his punishment would have likely been much more severe, the maximum penalty we understand being fourteen years imprisonment with hard labor.
We understand the Railway Company is willing to spare no trouble or expense to bring any offender interfering with goods in their or the Express Companies' care to Justice and they hope that the present case will prove an example to others. Although the warrant has been issued for Vincent O'Neill in connection with this matter he has not yet been secured, as he is stated to have disappeared from the district immediately afterwards, and has not yet been located.
We understand this man O'Neill is not only liable for Military Service, but is a deserter. Should he be found in the employment of any Company it will be a serious matter for them if facts are brought before the Military authorities.

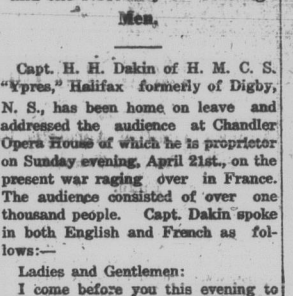
An old colored man named Zeno had a saving account in a Southern bank. One day the bank failed and Zeno was very much perturbed—though he didn't know it by that name.

CAPT. H. H. DAKIN SPEAKS AT CHANDLER

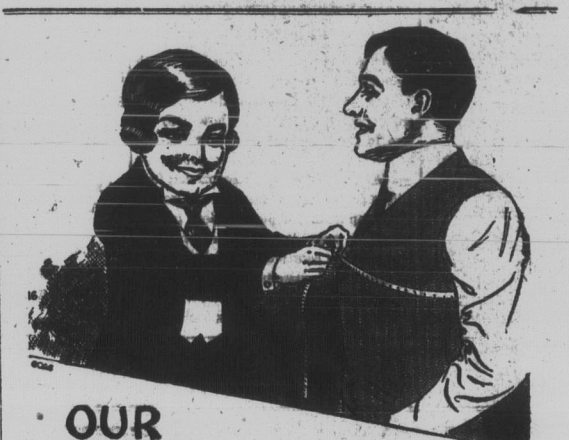
Spoke to Citizens About the War and the Necessity of Sending Men.



Capt. H. H. Dakin of H. M. C. S. "Ypres," Halifax formerly of Digby, N. S., has been home on leave and addressed the audience at Chandler Opera House of which he is proprietor on Sunday evening, April 21st, on the present war raging over in France. The audience consisted of over one thousand people. Capt. Dakin spoke in both English and French as follows:—
Ladies and Gentlemen:
I come before you this evening to say a few words on the present war, now raging in France, as a soldier and a Naval Officer, of which I am proud, not only for myself personally but because I am there to do what I can to help win this war. Before I start I want to say a few words about our boys. In case they are called in a very short time, send them away with a smile, a cheer, and a good word. It will help them on their way.
"I meet quite a few people on the street asking me: 'Capt. Dakin what do you think about the war, do you think that the Germans are going to win?' They are not going to win."
On August 4th, 1914, the war started. We will just go back a hundred years ago. Everybody remembers the song about Napoleon "En 1814 Napoleon ler." The nations that were fighting then against one another, are now fighting shoulder to shoulder against Napoleon's most bitter enemy, and they will fight to a finish.
On August 4th, 1914, the Kaiser said he would take his dinner in Paris in twelve days, but he has not had his dinner yet. He also said in his last drive that he would be in Paris on the first of April, but there was an April fool waiting for him, they have left him come within a few miles of Paris and then they stopped them, and drove them back. They could have driven them further but they did not want to sacrifice the men.
At that time we had the Russians fighting with us on the Eastern front, but since that the Russians have laid down their arms, but we have another nation with us to-day that will not lay down their arms, and that nation will fight to their last man, the United States of America, of which we are proud. (Cheers.)
What about the Navy? Many people have asked me, what has the Navy done, and what is it doing? If it had not been for the Navy the Germans would have been in Canada two years ago. We have cleared the seas of all German ships and raiders, with the exception of a few pirate German submarines. We have carried millions of men over thousands and thousands of miles of water from India, Africa, New Zealand, Australia, Canada and the United States with hardly any loss of life. It is a miracle what the navy has done, for the Navy rules the seas. (Cheers.)
The battle that is raging to-day on the Western Front is the beginning of the end, and even though the end is not near and even break, that does not mean that the Germans will win. Who is the first man that spoke about preparing Canada against the attacks of enemies? Sir Wilfrid Laurier. (Cheers), but he did not dare to come before the people with the Military Act, because we are in a free country, and there was not a man that was prepared to give five years of his life to the government for nothing, as the Germans have been doing, as the Germans trained their men saying one of theirs would be worth two of ours, but it has been proved different in this war. I have spoken to quite a number of officers back from the front in Halifax, and they say that there is no better men in the firing line than the Canadians. (Cheers.)
It is very likely that in a very short time, they will be asking our young men in Canada, to show the Germans that we have plenty of men yet, and the Allies want them in reserves.
Some people go on telling young men that they don't have to go, that they are fools to go, and so on, but the best place for those people are in jail, rather than to let them run loose as they are, and it will come to that sooner or later if they do not keep their tongues to themselves.
I want to say that when I came on the Gaspe Coast a young man of 21 years of age, I had already had ten years seaman'ship of which there were very few that knew it, and I have handled some big jobs both on land and on sea, and my friends here to night know it to be facts.
But it will be a glorious day when the war is over and the flags will be floating over every Allied Nation, so "Keep the home fires burning till the boys come home."—Prolonged Cheers.
