**TREASURE TROVE IN FAIR GASPE.**

Writer Tells Story of Historic Spot Very Interestingly in Montreal Star

Gaspe to many Canadians is a word associated with visions of green round topped mountains looming through the mist after an Atlantic voyage: the first sight of Canada: the south shore of the St. Lawrence. It recalls the memory of an antiquated paddle-steam coming out to ship the mail and the pilot, and a few sailing ships at anchor and the smoke of a few towns nestling at the foot of the mountains, and the impression of French-Canadian inhabitants, heavy fishermen and lumbermen. But this is really the least important part of Gaspe.

For the whole of the south shore of the Gaspe peninsula, bordering on the Bay of Chaleur, is a long 200 miles of continuous settlement, mainly English-speaking. When the eastern townships were a wilderness and Ontario contained only one or two trading posts, the first British soldier settlements in Canada were planted on the north of the Bay of Chaleur. They were men discharged from Wolfe's victorious army and they were put down on this coast and given three years' rations. Fishing companies from the Channel Islands gave them employment and supplied them with goods. The soil was fertile. Homes were cleared in the wilderness and in them their descendants have remained to this day.

After the American colonies revolted many loyalist families who had lost all their possessions through being true to the old flag, were given land grants on this coast, near New Carlisle, half way down the Bay. In this beautiful town on a hill by the sea are families possessing swords which served their ancestors in our ancient wars, and commissions dating from the days of Wolfe. And the spirit of Wolfe's men and the United Empire Loyalists remains, for New Carlisle gave ten per cent. of its total population to the combatant forces in the late war, and won two flags for Liberty Loan subscriptions. A number of D.C. M's and other decorations won by New Carlisle men, and the long Honor Roll in the church, testify how these men served their country.

Now there is a railway along this coast linking up the settlement with the Intercolonial; but it has only been built a few years. For over a century these soldier settlers and their descendants were almost shut off from communication with the rest of Canada except by sea for a few months in the summer. Consequently they have developed distinctive qualities of their own. Their fine ancestry, their hard natural life as fishermen and farmers, their bracing climate: the natural beauty of the land in which they live, these factors have contributed to develop the Gaspe character. Speaking generally, the men and women from this have strong hearts and bodies. They walk with a swing and are indifferent to bad weather. They are handsome and healthy and live to a great age.

There are no more hospitable people in the world than the Gaspe folk. Their hearts are big; but they are sincere and outspoken. Everybody knows everybody else, and all about their family history for generations. Nearly everybody is related to everybody else. Their dances are jolly affairs to which everybody comes, with old-fashioned fiddling, and old-fashioned fun. They fill the Protestant churches. Perhaps the sea: perhaps their isolation: perhaps their character: whatever is the cause: the people on this coast are deeply religious. They speak very frankly to their ministers when there is something they don't like or don't understand; but their appreciation of faithful ministry is very real.

**IMPROVEMENTS TO SEWERS PLANNED.**

Roseberry Street Will Receive Needed Attention as Soon as Possible

A meeting of the Committee of the Whole was held in the town clerk's office recently when the sewer difficulty was thoroughly discussed. The plans for a large portion of the work had already been prepared. These provide for an enlarged sewer on Roseberry street from the cor. of O'Leary to Minto, this sewer to have a special outlet into a sewer to be erected from Minto to the river, running under the railway tracks, the railway authorities having already given their consent and promising all possible assistance. The new arrangement it is believed will entirely overcome the flooding of basements particularly in the West End of the town. All sewerage matter above Sugar Loaf street is now carried to the river down Sugar Loaf street. From Sugar Loaf to Minto will under the new arrangement be carried to the river down what was formerly called Victoria street, and the surface sewers will be disconnected from the sanitary sewers.

The C. N. R. has also granted the town the privilege of using their four foot sewer running from Roseberry street to the river for a surface sewer.

Fish Hatcheries Under Dominion Control Handed Over to Quebec Government

The Provincial Government will take over tomorrow the two hatcheries which were handed over to the local Government by the Federal Department of Fisheries as a result of the efforts of Hon. J. E. Perreault, Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries, and the cooperation of Hon. Ernest LaPointe, Minister of Marine. The hatcheries are located at Tadoussac and at Gaspe Basin and were given to the local government without any contribution whatsoever. Mr. J. A. Belsie, Superintendent of Fish and Game stated to the Telegraph this afternoon, that the hatcheries would prove a great asset in helping the government to promote fisheries in this Province.

**SAINTE-ANNE DE RESTIGOUCHE.**

A RELIC OF BROUAGE.

On St. Ann's Day in the evening, an interesting event will take place, to wit; the dedication of a monument, the like of which exists nowhere, in the Dominion or in the United States. A Well Curb from the Convent of the Recollet Fathers of Brouage, France, native place of Champlain, and presented to the Fathers of this Mission, has been set in the yard of the Monastery, crowned by a dome on four columns, with proper inscriptions, in three languages, on slabs of marble. To suit modern tastes however, a jet d'eau has been adapted to the well. But the stones of the curb are just as they have been seen 300 years ago, at 2,500 miles from here by Champlain himself, in his youth, or on the occasions of his scanty visits in subsequent years, by the Recollet Friars, who came therefrom to this Country as Missionaries, and also by 140 French Priests, victims of persecution, who were imprisoned there in 1795.

A large crowd of visitors is expected for the dedication, to see and admire this precious relic of the past, and hear the explanations which will be given in English and French by competent speakers.

The Campbellton band will be in attendance and the ferry will cross until 10.30 p.m.

The railway trip along the north shore of the Bay of Chaleur is one of the most beautiful in the world.
