CITIZEN URGES RENEWED EFFORT IN SPORT PROJECT

Commends Promoters of Athletic Club for What Has Been Accomplished—Mentions Need and Pledges Support.

From a local man, who is evidently much interested in the sport movement organized during recent months, comes a letter which should serve to ameliorate whatever efforts are being put forth on behalf of athletic training and good clean sport and amusement for the young people of Campbellton. While commending the promoters of the movement for the progress they have made the writer of the letter is not slow to state his belief that much valuable time is being lost and that a remedy should be sought at once and the undertaking gone on with, without further delay.

The letter follows:
Editor, The Graphic,
Dear Sir:—
I would like to draw the attention of all those interested in the proposed "all-round athletic association" to the fact that very unnecessary delay is being permitted in the work of getting this club fully organized and on a working basis.

This movement, which is a most worthy one, was started early in the summer months and now winter is upon us and yet this association has not really been founded. No doubt there have been several problems to settle. The first question alone held up the enterprise for a considerable time but now that that has been disposed of and does not figure in the issue until next spring, there seems no reason why the undertaking should not go ahead and get things in shape for winter activities.

No one has any right to ridicule the efforts of the promoters of the sport movement. So far they have done very well. The undertaking is clearly a big one and most big undertakings are attended by slow growth at first. But in spite of these facts there seems of late to be a sudden lack of interest on the part of some of the officials. Days and weeks are slipping by and nothing further is being attempted. This is certainly no time to get discouraged. Those who took hold of the idea at the first practically tackled the impossible—at least so many people thought. And yet surprising success has attended their efforts. Hundreds of citizens, I believe, are now hoping that the undertaking will be a success, whereas early in the summer comparatively few people took any real interest.

The next steps and the immediate needs in completing organization are all familiar to the club officials. A lengthy article, full of good suggestions, published in your paper a few weeks ago gave a very comprehensive idea of the procedure which might be adopted.

Some of those who are naturally pessimistic may contend that this project cannot be successfully consummated this fall, but such an idea is unworthy of a progressive people. If an athletic club cannot be established now with conditions as favorable as they are, the bane might as well be buried without more fuss.

There is not a shadow of doubt. The necessity for good, clean amusement for boys and young men was never more apparent in Campbellton than it is today. Many of our youths are becoming a prey to harmful practices which we as citizens do not seem to be able to prevent. This is not supposition. I know exactly what I am talking about and could cite many incidents which would prove very alarming, to parents at least.

Many might seek to saddle the blame for such conditions on the Church. The Church may be responsible to a small extent but not to any great degree. It is not the church's duty to provide amusement. That is the duty of our older people who know the value of youth. Proper amusement, entertainment that would be physically, morally and mentally constructive can all be provided by a properly conducted association of the kind that has been proposed. Not having this clean, wholesome amusement now, our boys and young men are naturally turning to something harmful. The issue is up to the citizens of Campbellton and I believe that it is too serious a matter to neglect.

Whatever the hitch that is causing this lamentable delay it should be speedily discovered and a remedy effected. If those of the officials holding the balance of authority are sincerely
