VERDICT IN THE INQUEST ON CHAR-LOTTE GUSLING'S DEATH.

ensioner Wright and His Paramour, Mary Ann Clarke, Held for the Crime -The Postmortem Showed Death Was Due to a Shock-Evidence That Deceased Was Ill-Treated

"That Charlotte Gosling came to her death at the hands of Stephen Wright and Mary Ann Clarke," was the verdict returned last evening by the jury empan-elled by Coroner Pickering to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of Charlotte Gosling at 14 Symes-place,

The deceased woman was about 70 years of age and had been in a weak ondition for some time. She, with the two who have been indicted for her murs der, lived together at 14 Symes-place. Deceased Supported Them by Begging. According to the evidence of the neighbors, deceased was made to support the others by begging, and was roundly abused when her peregrinations were un

Pruitful. At 9.30 o'clock Monday evening, June 10, P. C. Robert McKee was informed that a woman had been found dead im Symes-place. When he reached the house Wright and Mrs. Clarke were in a state of intoxication. The body of the dead woman lay on a mattress on the floor, there being scarcely another article of there being scarcely another article of furniture in the house. There were no marks on the body save a bruise on the

marks on the body save a bruise on the brow immediately over the left eye. A Wound on the Forchead. Wright and Mrs. Clarks were too drunk to give any explanation of her death beyond the fact that she was alive but very weak when they left the house at 2 o'clock, and dead when they returned at 7. According to their statements the deceased had been suffering 'for some time with dropsy. A neighbor who ar-rived before the police took a small tin-pail from the hands of the deceased, Wright said he thought she had fallen from her chair and striking her head on the pail received the wound on her fore-head.

Wright and Mrs. Clarke, who, it is alleged, have been living together as man and wife, were taken into custody by Detective Duncan.
