LOCAL AND SPECIAL

A heavy thunderstorm passed over Bridgetown early this morning, the first of the season.

If summer finds the promise of it last two days, this will not be summerless year.

C. L. Berry has sold his double house on Granville Street East to G. R. Thert, who will occupy one flat.

The schooner Utopia will land lumber here this week, shipped by Shafner and Anderson for the West Indies.

The D. A. R. Blueshoe train comes on Monday, the 24th. The week-end Owl trains begin service on the 26th and 29th.

The D. A. R. bridge at Salmon River was burned last week necessitating transfer of passengers and cargo for a day or two.

Vegetation has taken a forward start. Although a little late in starting, the crops in the average are promising, with the exception of grass which is not as heavy as last year.

Anyone having a spraying outfit and having a little spare time could do a profitable business by notifying owners of small gardens who are not conveniently situated for doing their own spraying.

Of the team of nine riflemen representing Nova Scotia so successfully last week in the inter-Maritime match at Sussex, four belong to Annapolis County—Capt. F. W. Bishop, Lt. F. L. Milner, Lt. E. C. Schaffner, and Sgt. B. Saunders.

Ten apple evaporating factories, vineyards and canning factories are to be built before fall, by the Canada Lands Produce and Cold Storage Company, at a cost of sixty thousand dollars on the line of the D. A. R., which will give free sites. Why should not Bridgetown secure one these industries?

The barn of Freeman Corbett was struck by lightning during the morning's storm between six and seven o'clock and destroyed by fire. There was a horse, wagon and sleigh in the barn, which were saved, the horse being rescued with difficulty. A quantity of pressed hay was removed and sold yesterday.

J. B. Whitman, chief forest ranger for Annapolis County, has handed us a bulletin issued from the office of the Superintendent for Suppressing the Gypsy and Brown-tail Moths the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, which contains much information that would interest our readers and from which we shall publish extracts in a future issue.

The funeral of William Legge took place on Sunday afternoon from his late residence, and that of Richard Shipley on Saturday afternoon from St. James Church. A large number were present on each occasion to pay their last tribute of respect to esteemed citizen. The remains of the former were interred in the Bridgetown Cemetery, the latter in the church burial ground.

The Synod of the Church of England in the Diocese of Nova Scotia meets in Halifax next week, and Rev. E. Underwood and Albert Morse will be in attendance from Bridgetown. On his return Mr. Morse will be accompanied by Rev. W. H. Cunningham, who exchanges duties with Mr. Underwood for Sunday, June 30th. Doubtless Mr. Cunningham's many old friends will be pleased to see and hear him again.

At an early hour this morning the barn of William Chipman was destroyed by fire. It was a large structure used for storing hay and its only contents were a threshing machine belonging to Harry Clute, and two other machines belonging to other parties whose names are not ascertained. The fire was first discovered by W. J. Hoyt, who gave the alarm, but the building was then past saving. The barn was insured for three hundred dollars and is said to be worth about five hundred dollars. There was no insurance on the machinery it contained.
