

**Kathy Vandergrift (Canada)** Kathy Vandergrift is Senior Policy Analyst in Advocacy and Government Relations at World Vision Canada. She also chairs at the Canadian NGO Working Group on Children and Armed Conflict. She is a member of the Organising Committee for an International UN-NGO Consultation on Effective Implementation of Resolution 1261 on Children and Armed Conflict, being held in New York just prior to the Tribunal in Colchester. Prior to joining World Vision, Kathy worked as a policy advisor to government leaders at the federal and municipal level in Canada.

**Raffael Vonovier (South Africa)** joined ISS on secondment from the Swiss Ministry of Foreign Affairs in October 1999. He is a researcher at the Africa Early Warning Program (AEWP) and at the Arms Management Program (AMP). In addition, since 1997, she is the Director of the Research and Education Program at the Yugoslav Child Rights Centre. From 1992 to 1993, Nevena Vuckovic Sahovic worked as a senior advisor on international aspects of the protection of human rights at the Ministry for Human and Minority Rights of the SFR of Yugoslavia. From 1985 to 1992, she worked as a senior advisor at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Serbia for the implementation of international conventions and agreements in the Republic of Serbia. Nevena is Project Director of the Belgrade Center for Human Rights "Rights of the Child in Yugoslavia", as well as Member of the Human Rights Council of the Belgrade Center for Anti-War Action.
