SETTLEMENT IN KINGS COUNTY

Mr. MACDONALD (Kings):

1. Were any farms, machinery or stock purchased by the government or any department thereof for settlement purposes in Kings county, Prince Edward Island, during the year 1928?

Mr. RINFRET:

Department of Immigration and Colonization:

1 and 2. The department did not purchase any farms for settlement purposes in Kings county, Prince Edward Island, during the year

1928. It did purchase live stock, machinery and other equipment for persons settled in Kings county under the 3,000 British family scheme, but all such purchases were made out of loans advanced by the Imperial government to assist settlers in becoming properly established. No expenditures whatever out of Canadian government funds were made in the purchase of such stock and equipment.
