guard requires an additional hovercraft and that the Bell Aerospace hovercraft made in Canada meets all the operational requirements of the Canadian Coast Guard, can the minister assure the House that the Bell Aerospace hovercraft made in Canada is being seriously considered for purchase by the federal government as the machine needed for Canadian Coast Guard search and rescue operations?

Hon. Robert K. Andras (President of Treasury Board): Mr. Speaker, I will note the hon. member's very interesting representations.

Mr. McKinley: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Is the minister able to advise us whether or not at the present time Treasury Board and also cabinet have given approval for the purchase of a British hovercraft for the coast guard?

Mr. Andras: Mr. Speaker, I do not think I can add to my previous comment. If such a decision is made, it will be announced in the ordinary process.

In addition, does the minister now say that the previous study referred to in the press release of October 3, 1975 was inadequate or erroneous since he stated on January

18 last that a new task force is being established to study the arsenic situation in Yellowknife so as to determine what action should now be taken?

ARSENIC POLLUTION IN YELLOWKNIFE—MEASURES TO ASSURE NO CONCEALMENT OF PROBLEM

In view of press reports that certain officials in the minister's department have advised concealing from the Yellowknife public the risk it runs from arsenic poisoning, would the minister tell the House what measures he is taking to assure himself that there is no concealment of matters affecting the public interest, matters the public has a right to know?
