CANADIAN WHEAT BOARD

INITIAL GRAIN PRICES INQUIRY

Mr. Bill Gottselig (Moose Jaw): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of State for the Canadian Wheat Board. My constituents have expressed concerns regarding the United States Farm Bill and the probable effect it will have on the initial price of wheat. There is a good deal of concern and a cloud of uncertainty hanging over the farm community in western Canada these days. What can the Minister indicate to the House regarding initial grain prices for the 1986-87 crop vear?

Hon. Charles Mayer (Minister of State (Canadian Wheat Board)): Mr. Speaker, the Hon. Member raises a very serious situation. Everyone who understands the U.S. Farm Bill, and particularly what the European Community is doing as far as subsidies are concerned, realizes that we face a very difficult situation. The Hon. Member should know that in Europe, for instance, the subsidy on wheat is over \$100 per tonne, and on barley it is something like \$130 per tonne. We find that very difficult to compete with. However, I can tell the Hon. Member that we are facing the issue and we will do the very best we can. We expect to be able to announce initial prices at

the usual time, which is some time at the end of March or the beginning of April.

REQUEST THAT GOVERNMENT DECLARE MONTREAL A DESIGNATED REGION

Hon. André Ouellet (Papineau): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Finance. The Government likes to take credit for creating thousands of jobs in Montreal.
