The Budget

Mr. Loiselle: Madam Speaker, the hon gentleman said I do not understand. That is your problem. You have never understood this problem and you still do not understand it. To repay not a \$100 billion debt but a \$200 billion debt would mean \$40 billion of repayment a year. The interest on the debt was \$22 billion. In that current account there was a \$16 billion deficit. You should revisit your numbers. This is the problem. To pay it back we would need to have \$40 billion on top of our expenditures. This is the legacy you have left to this country and you should be ashamed of it.
