My dear Ormond: -Thank you very much for your letter of May 14th and for the trouble to which you have gone in getting me the report on the section of land. I am much interested in what you tell me concerning the revival of interest in the Militia in your district. I was glad to see that the Minister strongly opposed the effort to unite your district to one of the others. Such a policy would have been unwise, I am sure, and had it been done would only have to be undone in a very short time. I am sure you are glad to get your family together again. I am sorry, but I cannot agree with you in your statement that Regina appears to be the most expensive place in Canada in which to live. It may a pear to be but I know that Montreal I am leaving for England about the 16th of June to attend a Congress of the Universities of the Empire.
