INFORMATION REGARDING PROFESSORS KEPT ON TAP

Qualifications to be Enquired into by Bureau Respecting Principal Universities.

MONTREAL, May 23.—McGill University will be the scene on June 6 and succeeding days of a conference which may have far-reaching results upon the educational work of Canada and the Empire.

This conference is a preliminary gathering of the Canadian members of the Imperial Conference on Education, the main body of which will hold its second quinquennial meeting next year.

There will be present most of the heads of the Canadian universities, colleges and institutions of higher learning. Among the questions to be discussed will be the project put forward by Principal Peterson for a bureau of confidential information concerning the qualifications of professors, not only in Canada, but in all parts of the world, from which any university of the empire would be likely to seek candidates for its own vacancies.

The question of the proposed foundation of a set of scholarships for women, corresponding to the Rhodes and other similar ones, and looking to the interchange of students between the universities of the new dominions and those of Great Britain may also be dealt with.
