

## **ALTERNATIVE ROUTE** UNDER INVESTIGATION

Civic Engineers Find Few Difficulties in Way of Construction of Tubes Up Teraulay-St.

The route presented very little in the
way of difficulties or obstructions as
far north as College-street. In fact
it presents a great many advantages,
not the least of which is the absence
of paving which favors the quicker
and cheaper "open" method of construction on the subway. The city engineering staff state that property

interests, such as would arise were
Yonge-street chosen as the route, 15

Some Difficulties.

At College-street some more serious difficulties are met with. Proceeding dus north from the north end of Teraulay-street, dwelling houses numbered 54 and 56 are in the way and would have to be removed. Continuing towards Grenville-street two more houses would have to be taken and then the tube would take a curve eastward to St. Vincent and Grenville-

streets.

For some considerable distance the route is fairly unobstructed, but the Presbyterian church, standing at the corner of Grosvenor and St Vinces streets is in the way and would proably have to be removed. North of the residence of J. K. Osborne on the west side of Chapel-lane, and the St.


