Seasonable Recipes

Mutton and Tomato Pie.—Spread the bottom of a greased fireproof dish with bread crumbs and fill the dish with alternate layers of thinly sliced cold mutton and slices of peeled tomatoes. Season each layer with salt, pepper and dots of butter. Make the top layer of tomatoes; sprinkle with bread crumbs and dot with little pieces of butter. Bake in a moderate oven for three-quarters of an hour and serve very hot.

Lemon Pudding.—Cream one cup of sugar and three tablespoonfuls of butter, add yolks of four eggs, then two cups bread crumbs and one quart milk, with juice and rind of one lemon, one teaspoonful of salt, mix till smooth, put in general baking dish and bake; beat whites of eggs with one cup powdered sugar and juice of one lemon; spread on top of pudding and brown. Rice Batter Cakes.—Beat very light one egg, one teaspoonful salt, one teaspoonful of sugar, half cup of cooked rice, one cup milk, one cup flour, one teaspoonful of baking powder and fry on griddle greased with lard.

Home Helps

Before washing any piece of willow furniture, brush it thoroly, so as to remove every particle of dust. Otherwise no amount of washing will get the furniture clean.

When hot cloths are needed, instead of wringing them out of boiling water, heat them in a steamer.

If a porcelain dish becomes discolored on the inside, fill it with buttermilk and let stand for two or three days. The acid in the milk will remove all semblance of stain.

A fine grater is better than a knife for removing the surface of anything that is burned.

Purchase spent cotton, if possible, by the dozen, in assorted sizes, as the price is a trifle less and one then has the convenience of a suitable number for each piece of sewing.

The following selection would meet the various needs of the average family: One 110, for very fine darning or handkerchief making; one 100 and one 90 for work on thin summer dresses or infant outfits; three 80 and three 70, for underclothes, gingham dresses, table linen, etc.; one 60 and one 50, for buttonholes, buttonholes, etc.; one 40 and one 30, for specially heavy goods.

It is a mistake, born of inexperience, to use too strong cottons or a double thread.

Hon. Mr. Beck Tells Judgment Reserved After Hard Fight Over Park Bylaw

OTTAWA, May 14.—The practical operation of the Ontario hydro-electric scheme was today explained by Hon. Adam Beck to the New York State Legislature delegation, which has come to Ottawa with a view to ascertain the feasibility of adopting the Ontario plan to New York State's undeveloped water powers.

Mr. Beck went thoroughly into the Ontario plan. Lack of coal mines was the real cause of the hydro scheme in Ontario. It was not a socialistic proposition, and there was no politics in it. Financed by the province it was not for revenue purposes. In ten years there would be \$5,000,000 of dollars in the scheme. Advantages, of cheap heat, light and power were then explained by Mr. Beck, and questions asked were answered.

94th ANNIVERSARY.

Armstrong, D.D., occupied the chair, the program consisted of an address by the retiring superintendent, Mr. H. S. Ramsey, also solos, recitations and songs. The service was rendered by the senior scholars.

FURTHER SEARCH FOR BODIES

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 14.—(Can. Press.)—The sailing steamer Argenta, which has been chartered by the Canadian Red Cross to search for bodies of victims of the Titanic disaster, will sail to-morrow. The vessel will have on board fifty coffins and material for embalming such bodies as may be recovered.

Death of Varsity Student.

Widespread regret is expressed in university circles at the death yesterday of Chase A. Woodward, fourth year student in biology and physics. He was the fourth son of John Woodward, 124 Shaw-st. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon. The service will be held at St. Anne's Anglican Church, thence to Prospect Cemetery.
