TRADES COUNCIL'S STRONG PROTEST

Requests Influence of Trades Congress to Abolish Pernicious Commissions.

Toronto Trades Council last night unanimously passed a resolution requesting the Electrical Workers' Union to refuse to take further part in the commission headed by Judge Barron investigating the electrical workers' strike of September 3, requesting the Dominion Trades Congress to use its efforts to stop the investigation altogether, and to demand the immediate dissolution of the present commission.

This resolution was preceded by much discussion, the trend of which was a sentiment strongly protesting against the encroachments suggested in the questions asked by counsel for the Toronto Railway Company. The whole discussion rested upon the privileges of the employers generally to investigate into the finances and workings of unions, such privileges have to be amended in proposed amendments to the present Lemieux act. A strong political touch was also brought into the discussion by many, who pointed out that the Ontario elections had influenced Labor thought tremendously through the Dominion, and that, as a result, the Dominion parliament would either have to amend legislation favorably for the worker or risk defeat at the hands of the electorate.

Making it a Precedent. James T. Gunn, business agent for the Electrical Workers' Union, stated that an endeavor was being made to make the present investigation commission a precedent for all disputes under the Lemieux act, and that this was a body blow to the rights of trades unionism. A resolution of protest was considered, but not moved, John MacDonald, recent candidate for Southwest Toronto, moving and James McArthur Connor seconding the resolution passed at the close of the session. Street railway delegates, without dissent, opposed this resolution, strongly urging that a protest be sent to the Dominion Trades Congress.

Ad Futility. Many delegates, in reply, agreed with John MacDonald that such action would be futile, and that while Labor was faintly protesting, clever counsel for the railway company would quickly look thru the books of the Electrical Workers' Union, and the government at Ottawa, seconding such action, would amend the Lemieux act so that corporation counsel for all manner of corporations would be enabled to follow suit, thus disclosing to these corporations means whereby they could kill trades unionism.

In answer to various questions put to him, James T. Gunn stated that the union had decided upon certain lines of action and that he would carry out a dirty cur to refuse to receive any of their demands. "Once they decided to strike, I was heart and soul with them. There were men among them with families who were receiving as low as \$11 a week."

POLICE HOLD DRIVER

Truck Meets Truck With Disastrous Results for John Webb.


John Webb, 342 Waverley road, suffered two spinal injuries requiring seventeen stitches to close the wounds at noon yesterday, when he was hurled from a motor truck in a collision at the corner of Ulster street and Brunswick avenue. Webb, a driver for Brown Brothers, 592 West Queen Street, was driving east on Ulster street when a truck traveling south on Brunswick at a high rate of speed struck the side of the car driven by Webb and hurled it up on the sidewalk of the southeast corner of the street. Webb was thrown thru the windshield of his car and rendered unconscious. He was rushed to the Western Hospital where his condition is regarded as fairly good. Robert McLeich, 918 Palmerston avenue, was arrested and taken to Markham street station and charged with criminal negligence.

The car driven by McLeich is owned by the Carmichael Waterproof Company. Webb's truck was badly damaged. McLeich was released in the afternoon on bail.
