Blood Spilled in City Council cf Quebec, Where a Free Fight Ensues.

Quebec, March 24.-In the legislative ssembly yesterday afternoon Provincial Treasurer McCorkill made the minsterial announcements. He stated the ent would continue the policy of Revolt Extends.

The spirit of revolt against Mr. Parent's autocratic rule is extending even to the city government. In the civid finance committee last night there was a regular free fight. The committee had met to decide certain questions before Parent's departure for the United States, and among other things to settle the appropriations for the next twelve months. Mr. Parent was present. The shindy began with a proposition to increase the pay of the police and firemen, which was strongly supported by one of the oldest aldermen, who, up to lately, had been one of the mayor's particular friends. It appears that in the course of the discussion the mayor told this alderman that evidently he did not understand the city's position, whereupon the alderman retorted that evidently Mr. Parent took the committee for a lot of fools, and the mayor retorted by telling the alderman he had better learn how to write. This insulting remark provoked a sharp rejoinder from the alderman, and some of his colleagues, who sided with the mayor, called upon the chairman refused, and a noisy wrangle ensued, in the course of which such words as "pup," "bag-of-wind," "you're no good" were exchanged, and the meeting broke up amid great excitement.

Immediately after the adjournment the war started in earnest, the alderman who had quarrelled with the mayor being struck in the mouth by one of Parent's friends, and the assaulted man returning the blow with his heavy walking stick upon his assailant's head. Both then clinched, and the melee became general. Blood was spilled, blows were exchanged, sticks were brought into action, and the scene was very exciting if not very edifying. Many of the combatants had their overcoats off, and collars and ties were scattered over the floor. Finally wiser heads interfered, and the combatants were separated. This interesting incident occupied about 15 minutes.

Nearly all the non-resident members of the legislature left for home last night in consequence of the long adjournment. The parliament buildings are almost completely deserted to-day. All the extra or sessional employes have been paid off and discharged until April 25. Speaker Tessier of the legislative assembly has resigned that office and was sworn in to-day as minister of agriculture in the government.

AFTER SEEING THE POPE.

He is particularly severe upon those militant and anti-Republican Catholics of the Modern Novel" at the Unitarian Club dinner on Monday militant and anti-Republican Catholics who, having diverted upon the church the anger of the powers that be, are, he holds, the persons largely responsible for the present ecclesiastical crisis in France. This, he says, is by no means accidental. Certain recent incidents may have brought it to a head but he is convinced that the "blind and fratricidal struggle" in the French dioceses themselves, of which the real faithful have been the victims, is one of the great causes of the present state of things. "Let us distrust," he says, "those who heedlessly adopt a religious standard in order to rush into sorry pellitical strife, for the politician is the born enemy of religion. Those of us who are prudent and self-controlled are made responsible for the outrageous and virulent prose of certain sycophants without intelligence, without talent, or authority other than that which in their vanity they arrogate to themselves. Among these spokesmen of Catholicism there are some violent people who are as harsh to their brothers in arms as to their enemies." Mgr. Oury urges Roman Catholics to "disarm suspicion and hared by their pacific devotion to social order." He says expressly that he brings back from Rome "the wish to see you (the French Catholics) gentle, courageous, and humble," a statement which is regarded as an expression of the personal thought and policy of the Pope. M. de Lanessan, writing in The Siecle, remarks: "The Catholic Church will soon be separated from the state, as will the other churches. By the loss of its official character it will cease to be what it has always been in our country—a redoubtalways been in our country—a redoubt-able and dreaded power. It will hence-forth be merely the representative or-ganism of a respected religion, which, confined within the limits of its pub-lic worship, will have only such moral authority as it will secure by its conduct. Upon this conduct will depend not merely its prestige as a church, but also its very existence as a religion."


