New York, Feb. 24.—The World's correspondent at Tokio, Japan, says: China's enormous debt to Japan bids fair to cause awkward compilications. The second instalment of fifty million taels will fall due in three months, yet, so far as can be discovered, no provision has been made for payment. The Pekin Government apparently looks to Russia for protection against Japanese reprisals, or, in case of need, to the European league which held the conquering empire in check a year ago. Japan's Ministers have been deliberating for several weeks upon the course to pursue if China defaults. To reopen hostilities would be impracticable, to threaten would probably be unavailing. The Japanese have in view a line of action which they believe will precipitate the dismemberment of China, and enable them to secure a substantial share.

MANITOBA WILL PROTEST

ATTORNEY-GENERAL SIFTON HAS GIVEN NOTICE

Of a Strong Resolution, which will be Passed by the Legislature of the Prairie Province-A Declaration that the Remedial Bill is Unnecessary - Any Wrongs will be Righted.

Winnipeg, Feb. 24.—(Special.)—In the Legislature to-day Attorney-teneral Sifton gave notice of a resolution protesting against the passage of the measure by the Federal Parliament re-establishing Separate Schools in Manitoba. After reciting the various steps taken in the controversy the resolution proceeds:

sufficiently wide to embrace all available facts relating to the past or present school systems;

"That it sincerely regretted that these repeated and earnest invitations for an enquiry have been absolutely ignored by the advisers of His Excellency, who propose, without complete information themselves, to ask coercive legislation from Parliament, a great majority of whose members are necessarily without full knowledge of the facts relative to the past and present school systems of Manitoba;

"That, in amending the school law from time to time, and in the administering of the school system of the province, it is our carnest desire to remedy any well-founded grievances, and to remove any appearance of inequality or injustice that be brought to our notice, and to consider any complaint which may be made in apprit of fairness and conciliation;

"That it is admitted by all competent authorities that the system of Separate Schools for the minority established and carried on under Dominion legislation, cannot be made effective without active and substantial co-operation and assistance of the Provincial authority;

"That, since the order-in-Council of Dec. 21, 1895, which at forth the policy of the advisers of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, the policy therein set forth has been submitted to the electors of the province, with the result that the people have, in the exercise of their franchise, approved.
