The meanest objection he had heard yet to the contract was that offered by Mr. Foster, who wept over the woes unfortunate settler, and his great objection was that the land company also owned the odd-numbered sections. Mr. Sifton said he had remarked earlier in the debate that Mr. Foster lacked courage, but there was a difference between "courage" and "nerve." While he could not say that the member for North Toronto was overburdened with courage, he was hound to admit there was no lack of was bound to admit there was no lack of colossal. If the land company had the odd-numbered sections also, where did they get them? made himself heard. When he had quit, Mr. Sifton, quick as a flash, dived into his handbag, brought out Hansard, and quickly replied: "Page 1,082, unrevised Hansard, bottom of page." He then flung the book down, and the Liberals cheered. Summing up the results of the land policy of the Conservative Government, Mr. Sifton pointed out that they had given 31,500,000 acres in land grants to ratiways and other companies, whereas railways and other companies, whereas during the whole eighteen years they were in office they only gave \$,500,000 acres actual settlers under homestead entries. In contrast with this the Liberal Govern-ment since 1896 had, in various shapes and forms, disposed of 2,000,000 acres of land to companies, including irrigation companies and the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company, and lands purchased with half-breed scrip, and, in round numbers, during that period they had given for homestead entries to actual settlers in quarter-section areas 20,000,000 acres of land. (Cheers.) He was not surprised that the men who had supported the policy of the men who had supported the former Government did not approve a policy so different in its results from theirs.
