German Sub Crews Reported To Be Opposing Revolution

SOCIALISTS STORM AUSTRIAN PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS

CANADA'S DELEGATES TO THE PEACE CONFERENCE SAILED FOR ENGLAND A WEEK AGO

Censorship Regarding Sailings and Restrictions With Reference to Locations of Canadian Battalions Lifted.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The censorship, which has since the beginning of the war prohibited the publication of sailings and itineraries of merchant vessels, has been lifted, and shipping news and advertisements may now be printed as in peace times except that for the present, silence as to war vessels, ships under Government contracts, and munition shipments must still be maintained. Moreover all restrictions placed upon statements with reference to battalions members and location of battalions are withdrawn as regards troops in France, Flanders, Egypt, Palestine, Mesopotamia, Italy, Saloniki and East Africa. It is, therefore, as a result of this lifting of censorship ban possible to now announce that Sir Robert Borden, Hon. A. L. Sifton, Sir Geo. Foster, Frank P. Jones, Dr. Robertson, Col. Biggar, P. M. Draper and Messrs. Christie and Buskard, secretaries, left Ottawa on November 8 and sailed for Great Britain from New York on the following day. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, and his secretary, Thomas Ahern, left Ottawa yesterday, and will join the other party in London. They will take part in the peace negotiations, and the majority of the party will be absent probably for some months. Their absence, however, will have no effect upon the calling of parliament, when it is decided that the representatives of the people shall be called.

GERMANY MUST EXPERIENCE MORAL REVOLUTION BEFORE SHE CAN BE ADMITTED TO THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Leo Bergois, Former French Cabinet Minister, Also Maintains That An International Constitution Is A Necessity For the Future.

Paris, Nov. 15.—"Germany must undergo a moral revolution as well as a political upheaval before she can be admitted to a league of nations," says Leo Bergois, former cabinet minister, who is president of a commission recently appointed to study the plan for a great combination of states for the future. SOCIALISTS STORM AUSTRIAN PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, 20 ARE INJURED DURING TROUBLE

Red Flag Is Cheered by Men Who Demand Establishment of a Socialist Republic.

London, Nov. 15.—Socialists stormed the Austrian Parliament Building in Vienna Wednesday, and tried to effect the chamber where the new state council was in session. Shots were fired before order could be restored and persons in the crowd outside the building were injured, according to dispatches reaching here. President Dinghofer declared that the firing began from the Parliament Building.

CHICAGO SOCIALISTS TO CELEBRATE FALL OF THE EX-KAISER

Address Will Be Delivered in Seven Languages at Sunday Meeting.

Chicago, Nov. 15.—Socialists here have called a mass meeting for next Sunday to celebrate the downfall of the German emperor.

The list of speakers includes several under indictment for violation of the espionage act, among them Victor L. Berger, congressman-elect of Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

GERMAN OFFICERS ARE KILLED IN DISORDERS IN CITY OF BRUSSELS

Soldiers' Councils Have Been Formed There and at Antwerp.

London, Nov. 14.—More than 100 men, mostly German officers, have been killed in disorders in Brussels, and soldiers' councils have been formed in that city and at Antwerp, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

The new national flag of red, white and red was hoisted over the building, but later someone removed the white band and the crowd cheered the red flag.

CROWN PRINCE MADE CIRCUITOUS ROUTE TO AVOID MUTINOUS TROOPS

Reached Maastricht, Holland, After a Sensational Trip.
Amsterdam, Nov. 14.—Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany arrived at Maastricht on Tuesday from Spa, having taken a circuitous route in order to avoid mutinous troops. The party, which traveled in three motor cars, was held up by frontier guards because all its members were armed. Intervention was ordered, but when it became known that one of the party was the crown prince, all were disarmed and detained until the arrival of the Dutch commander at Maastricht and other officials.

London, Nov. 15.—An American mission will leave on Saturday for Spa, German headquarters, according to a French wireless dispatch received here.

UP GOES HONOR FLAG TO PROVE CITY HAS GIVEN WELL TO LOAN

Emblem Raised on City Hall by Mayor at Noon.

PRESENTED BY G. M. REID

Mayor Somerville Declares for Extra Pay for Overseas Men.

London hoisted the Victory Loan honor flag at 12:15 o'clock today, amid great enthusiasm. Mayor Somerville, using the necessary "pull" to raise the flag which measures twelve feet by twenty-four to the top of a specially-erected pole on top of the city hall. The flag went up to the strains of Rule Britannia.

The raising of the flag means that London citizens have subscribed \$7,300,000 to the loan that will bring the boys in khaki home from Europe's war-torn fields. However, \$600,000 more must be subscribed by tomorrow night, when the loan closes, before London will have obtained her real objective. Headed by the band of the W. O. R., the parade to the city hall began at noon, headed by Chairman George M. Reid, District Organizer W. C. Breit, City Organizer Norman Tovey and Major Gordon Ingram, chairman of the loan publicity committee of the loan. Following came Chairman Arthur White of the industrialists, and Secretary W. R. Kaplinsky, J. J. Foot and W. A. Martin, heads of the teams committees. The parade was followed by a procession of canvassers, the rest of the salesmen parading behind.

The presentation. Mayor Somerville and Controllers Reid and Charles A. Merrifield met Chairman Reid in front of the city hall, the mayor receiving the flag from Mr. Reid, who presented it on behalf of the governor-general of Canada. "It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present your worship with this flag," stated Mr. Reid. "The citizens have done nobly, but there is still great need of more money, and we ask that every dollar that can be spared be invested in Victory Bonds between now and tomorrow night. The canvassers have done wonderfully well and a great deal of credit is due them. While the war is over, the money is needed worse than ever, and it has been left for us to obtain it. We cannot fail the boys now. We have to do more than enough. These cheer and a tiger were proposed at this juncture for Chairman Reid, the mayor, J. J. Foot and the city. Continued on Page Nineteen.

TO EDITH CAVELL

55,000 CANADIANS HAVE LAID DOWN THEIR LIVES

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—Over 55,000 Canadian soldiers have laid down their lives in the war, according to official figures just issued here. Total casualties received here to November 13 are given at 213,263, an aggregate which will likely be increased owing to the fact that the troops of the Dominion were engaged in heavy fighting at Mons up to the last minute of the fighting, and reports of the latest casualties are still being received at Ottawa.

AMERICAN AVIATORS LAND AT COLOGNE

London, Nov. 15.—American aviators landed at Cologne, on the Rhine, Thursday, according to Cologne dispatch to the Copenhagen Politiken, and transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph Company.

GERMANS OMITTED SEVERAL PORTIONS OF TERMS IN PUBLICATION

Col. Wade Quoted as Saying Articles Relating to Food Were Left Out.

Copenhagen, Nov. 15.—The Politiken quotes the British military attaché here, Col. Wade, as saying in an interview that the Germans, in publishing the terms of the armistice, omitted six or seven articles, including that relating to the Allies providing food for the prisoners.

SPANISH INFLUENZA IS CHECKED IN U. S. CAMPS

Washington, Nov. 15.—For the first time since Spanish influenza became epidemic in army camps at home, the disease effectively checked. Figures made public today record a decrease of about one-third in the number of cases for the week ending November 8 as compared with the previous week. The total was 5,857, as compared with 12,175.

SOCIALISTS REVOKE THE STRIKE ORDER IN SWITZERLAND

Unconditional Cancellation of Instructions Are Reported in Official Message.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Unconditional revocation of the general strike order in Switzerland by the Socialistic committee was reported today in an official message to Swiss Minister Sulzer here.

LABOR REPRESENTATIVES WILL INTERVIEW GOVT.

Delegates Will Be Received by Acting Premier on November 27.
Ottawa, Nov. 15.—On Wednesday, November 27, the annual interview of the labor forces of Canada will take place with the Federal Government. Cabinet here, when the decisions reached at the Quebec convention will be presented. Among other requests to be made will be old age pensions, increased pensions for soldiers, etc. The acting premier, Sir Thomas White, with the other members of the cabinet, will receive the delegation, for which arrangements were made by Sir Robert Borden, previous to his departure overseas. A strong representation of the labor forces will be in attendance.

SPAIN WILL ADHERE TO FOREIGN POLICY ADOPTED IN 1902

Pacific Agreements With Britain and France Included in Govt's Plan.

Madrid, Nov. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—At the first meeting of the new Spanish ministry, held early this morning, the foreign policy of the government was discussed. The ministry has issued a note stating that the new government will be directed in a democratic spirit and guaranteeing that order will be maintained throughout Spain.

FRENCH ARMY TO ENTER STRASSBURG ON NOVEMBER 25

Ceremonies of Taking Over City to Fall Ten Days Later.

Paris, Nov. 15.—The French army will make an official entry of Strasbourg on November 25, according to an official announcement. High officials will go to the city eight days later for the ceremonies incident to the retaking of Alsace and Lorraine by France.

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Drumheller, Dec. 15.—Albert Arnold, the Verdant Valley farmer who on Monday night last shot and instantly killed Tip Blaine of Drumheller, has been committed for trial on the charge of murder.

Copenhagen Dispatch To London Daily Express Says That Action Was Taken At a Mass Meeting At Bruntsbuttel.

London, Nov. 15.—The crews of German U-boats, at a mass meeting at Bruntsbuttel, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Daily Express, resolved to oppose the revolution and reinstate the officers. They decided to fly the national flag instead of the red flag.

DUTCH EXTREMISTS' DEMAND FOR ABDICATION OF QUEEN IS CAUSING MUCH ANXIETY

Jonkheer Colyn, Former Minister of War, Has Returned to Holland, It Is Believed, to Take Charge of Govt.

London, Nov. 15.—The threatening attitude of the extremists in Holland, who have demanded the abdication of Queen Wilhelmina, is causing anxiety at The Hague, according to the Daily Express.

Jonkheer Colyn, the former minister of war, who has been in London since July, returned to Holland Thursday. He was recalled, the Daily Express believes, to take charge of the Government.

DUTCH GOVT. IS ALARMED AT THE SOCIALISTS' STAND

Appeals to Citizens to Support It In "Grave Crisis."

The Hague, Thursday, Nov. 14.—The Dutch Government has issued a proclamation urging the citizens to support the government in a "grave crisis." The government is threatening to seize power, and declares its determination to maintain authority and order.

ALLIES WILL SEND AID TO RESTORE ORDER IN POLAND

Forces of Violence and Disorder Must Be Quelled.

London, Nov. 14.—The British foreign office has issued a statement saying: "Reports of a program at Warsaw should be taken seriously. Should the reports prove true, it would point to a serious situation, because of the violence and disorder already threatening the life of every population between the Rhine and the Volga would be endangered." The statement points out that the Allies and United States are ready to lend their whole resources to the task of restoring the economic basis of order, and that they are showing by their acts that they desire order and civilization.
