Leo Bergois, Former French Cabinet Minister, Also Maintains That An Internat ional Constitution Is a Necessity For the Future.

Paris, Nov. 15.—"Germany must undergo a moral revolution as well as a political upheaval before she can be admitted to a league of nations," says Leo Bergois, former cabinet minister, who is president of a commission recently appointed to study the plan for a great combination of states for the future.

"The universal war has demonstrated to all nations the necessity for an international military international constitution," he says. "This would assure to each nation the sanctity of its rights. Diplomatic and judicial into intolerable solitude, and not only the state but its citizens would suffer. President Wilson has admitted the legitimacy of penalties, and said that they might possibly be used against the control powers. "If this weapon should fail, there would remain international military intervention. But economic measures which would deprive a country of raw materials and interrupt land and sea transport would be sufficient to crush resistance."

SPAIN WILL ADHERE TO FOREIGN POLICY

Pacific Agreements With Britain and France Included In Govt.'s Plan.

Madrid, Nov. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—At the first meeting of the new Spanish ministry, held early this week, it was unanimously decided, after an address by Premier Romanones, to continue the policy which was initiated in 1902 and reaffirmed in 1907 and 1913. The ministry has issued a note saying that the new government will be directed in a democratic spirit and guaranteeing that order will be maintained throughout Spain.

The foreign policy referred to in the above dispatch apparently alludes to pacific agreements with France and Great Britain by which integrity of coasts and insular and colonial possessions in the east Atlantic and Mediterranean were mutually guaranteed by the three countries. This foreign poicy of Spain was considered a stepaimed against German aggression. In 1907 the signature of a treaty between Spain, France and England carrying out the above objects was looked upon as the foundation of "a future united states of Europe."
