United States Has Always Co-operated Successfully With
Canada, Says Mississippi Valley Speaker, in Telling
Appeal For United Action — Mayor Little of London
Speaker.

DETROIT, July 23.—(By Canadian Press.)—"There has not been a time since the civil war," declared Harry M. Merrick, president of the Mississippi Valley Association, speaking to the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Congress at the Board of Commerce this afternoon, "when we have not co-operated successfully with Canada. We don't need forts or armaments or armies, because we're all one. Let's unite now as we did during the great war, when the boundary was a boundary only on the map. There was no boundary between our hearts.'

"Our transportation must be co-ordinated and co-operated," was the declaration of Hon. A. P. Nelson, member of Congress for the eleventh district of Wisconsin, who has the reputation of being the real father of the St. Lawrence waterways movement, having been the first member to agitate in favor of the waterway in the House of Congress.

"The development of this project will mean more than the clasping of hands across the border; it will mean more than the intertwining of the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes. It will mean that here every flag on the face of the earth will find ingress and egress in the transportation and production of the necessaries of life for all the world.

The address of Watson S. Moore, second vice-president of the United States Grain Corporation, was devoted almost entirely to the shortage of cars and its effect upon the industrial, economic and industrial life of the two nations.

Promises Support. Speaking at the night session Govrnor William L. Harding of Iowa, referred to the pproject from the stand-point of his own state, promising his support for the project and the sup-port of all the people in the Mississippl

port of all the people in the Mississippi Valley.

"In the blind struggle in which we are engaged," said he, "with capital and labor gripping each other by the throat, we are asleep at the switch. The train of Opportunity is passing our door. The Allies, as well as Germany, are out after the bacon, while we hold an animated tea party, debating whether the suit we wear is to be green or peagreen. Where is the business sagacity that has characterized our men in the past? We have the sinews of war and the men to lead. Let us submerge our differences at home and our quarrels among ourselves and go into the martis of trade and conquer for all our people and for all our interests."
