**MERRICK VISIONS FLAGS OF
NATIONS FLYING ON LAKES
WITH WATERWAYS REALITY**United States Has Always Co-operated Successfully With
Canada, Says Mississippi Valley Speaker, in Telling
Appeal For United Action — Mayor Little of London
Speaker.

DETROIT, July 23.—(By Canadian Press.)—"There has not been a time since the civil war," declared Harry M. Merrick, president of the Mississippi Valley Association, speaking to the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Congress at the Board of Commerce this afternoon, "when we have not co-operated successfully with Canada. We don't need forts or armaments or armies, because we're all one. Let's unite now as we did during the great war, when the boundary was a boundary only on the map. There was no boundary between our hearts."

"Our transportation must be co-ordinated and co-operated," was the declaration of Hon. A. P. Nelson, member of Congress for the eleventh district of Wisconsin, who has the reputation of being the real father of the St. Lawrence waterways movement, having been the first member to agitate in favor of the waterway in the House of Congress.

"The development of this project will mean more than the clashing of hands across the border; it will mean more than the intertwining of the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes. It will mean that here every flag on the face of the earth will find ingress and egress in the transportation and production of the necessities of life for all the world."

The address of Watson S. Moore, second vice-president of the United States Grain Corporation, was devoted almost entirely to the shortage of cars and its effect upon the industrial, economic and industrial life of the two nations.

Promises Support.
Speaking at the night session Governor William L. Harding of Iowa, referred to the project from the standpoint of his own state, promising his support for the project and the support of all the people in the Mississippi Valley.

"In the blind struggle in which we are engaged," said he, "with capital and labor gripping each other by the throat, we are asleep at the switch. The train of Opportunity is passing our door. The Allies, as well as Germany, are out after the bacon while we hold an animated tea party, debating whether the suit we wear is to be green or pea-green. Where is the business sagacity that has characterized our men in the past? We have the sinews of war and the men to lead. Let us submerge our differences at home and our quarrels among ourselves and go into the markets of trade and conquer for all our people and for all our interests."

An address on the types of ships to be required when the waterway is an accomplished fact, was delivered by C. C. West, president of the Manitowish shipbuilding company, and Charles Evan Fowler of New York, member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, delivered an illustrated talk on the port facilities which would be necessary for the project.

During the afternoon a resolution of the Milwaukee delegation was read, asking that all chambers of commerce and boards of trade in Canada and the United States form committees to give their particular attention and effort to the development of the St. Lawrence waterway. The resolution was handed to the resolutions committee to be presented with the other resolutions at tomorrow's session.

J. W. Worthington of the Tennessee River Improvement Association, extended an invitation to the convention of his association next spring. A short address in support of the work of the congress was also delivered by Governor Albert S. Sleeper of Michigan.

**CANADIAN DAY
AT HUGE CONGRESS**

DETROIT, July 22.—This morning's session was Canadian Day at the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence tidewater congress at the Detroit Board of Commerce, several prominent Canadian visitors being introduced to the congress and delivering short addresses.

The first Canadian speaker was O. E.

the aim of securing definite action on the project.
In response to the resolution a unanimous vote of thanks was passed to the Canadian delegates for the whole audience for their promises of support.
"This is the most important matter which has faced Canada since confederation," declared Mayor T. L. Church of Toronto. "We must go ahead with the project; we must not stand still on a question of such international commercial importance."
I hope that everyone here will live to see the fulfillment of our visions of a waterway from the lakes to the sea.

From every angle the project is desirable. It means cheaper transportation, greater production on our farms and more rapid efficient handling of all the problems of the sea, the farm, the forest and the mine.

There will be no trouble between the United States and Canada. The Americans are our own people and blood is thicker than water. You are one with us in those high democratic ideals of right, justice and honor. In all the 40,000 miles of border between the two countries there is not one permanent armed force and no fortifications except for one little old fort at the mouth of the Niagara River. "You have a peaceable, friendly neighbor beyond your northern border even though you have not one on your southern boundary."

Introductory Mayor Little, Ontario, and Controller O'Hara of Hamilton were also introduced at the gathering, and received enthusiastic ovations.
The chief speaker of the morning's session was to have been Senator Poincaré of Washington, but he sent a message, saying that he regretted that other engagements prevented his attendance. In his absence his message to the congress was read by William H. Adams, chairman of the inland waterways committee of the Detroit Board of Commerce.

"One of the acute problems facing the nation today," said the message, "is the present congestion of freight on our railways. It is having a serious effect on our national life. Production on our farms has been seriously cut down, many lumber mills on our Pacific coast have been forced to cease operations and cattle are dying on our ranges because of the impossibility of transporting them to the markets of our own countries and other parts of the world."

**LIBERALS MAY
GO TO COURTS
TO OUST CURRY**

Toronto Association Threatens Injunction To Put Member Out.

TORONTO, July 23.—It is said the Southeast Toronto Liberal Association is threatening to apply for an injunction to prevent J. W. Curry, K.C., Liberal member for seat "B" in Southeast Toronto, from taking his seat when the Legislature meets again. The ground of the suggested legal proceedings is that Mr. Curry was elected by the voters of the riding to represent them, but is not representing them, because he is running counter to their wishes in refusing to follow the leadership of H. Hart, Liberal leader in Ontario.

"I don't care what they decide to do," Mr. Curry said today, with reference to the matter. "They may do what they like. It's just a little silly talk."

The talked-of move against Mr. Curry is the outcome of his open declaration at the time and place he would no longer follow Mr. Dewar's leadership, and his supposed plotting to oust Mr. Dewar from the Liberal leadership and to substitute Mr. J. C. Talmie of Windsor as the Liberal leader in this province. At recent caucus of Liberal M. P.'s here a resolution expressing confidence in Mr. Dewar was passed.

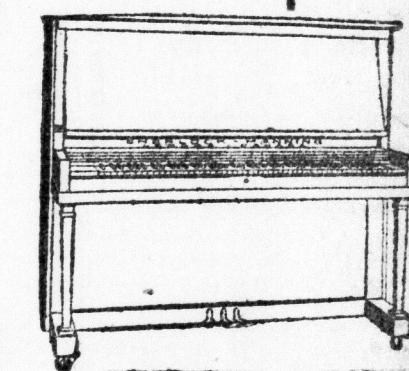
